AUXILIARY TO SPONSOR DANCE AT FACILITY WEDNESDAY

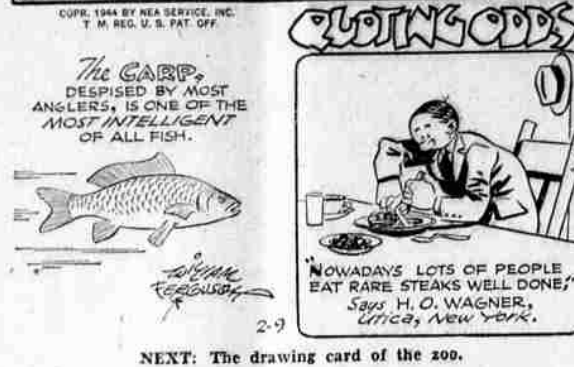
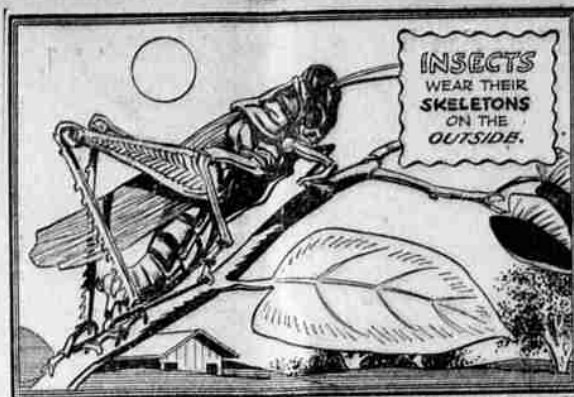
