

Zoning System for Roseburg Considered

dences built anywhere within the city and is recommended by Fire Chief Glenn Taylor because of a present lack of regulation resulting in many dangerous practices in building fires.

The council was informed by Councilman Croft that an extensive zoning program is under consideration. Two methods were proposed, one the appointment of a planning commission, and the other to continue the work under sponsorship of the city council. The latter procedure was tentatively adopted and the fire commissioners were authorized to continue with their study. The plan would divide the city into business, class A residential, class B residential, industrial and warehouse districts and would specify construction rules for each area. Copies of similar plans adopted by other cities are being carefully studied preliminary to undertaking the program in Roseburg. Public hearings will be held before adoption of any plan.

Curfew Laws Conflict

Chief of Police Erwin Short urged a curfew ordinance, stating that the city now has three conflicting curfew laws, none of which meet current needs. The present laws, he said, impose penalties against the children rather than against the parents. The proposed new ordinance would provide a 10 o'clock curfew applying to children under 18 years of age. It would, however, specify violations to consist of "loitering," "strolling" or "playing" on the streets and would not affect children engaged in any errand or employment or proceeding directly from places of amusement to their homes. Penalties would be in the nature of fines imposed against the parents with increasing fines and/or imprisonment for repeated offenses.

The chief cited the case of a 12-year old boy who has been in juvenile court on numerous occasions and who roams the streets at night, defying the police and causing considerable trouble. The proposed ordinance is one suggested by the League of Oregon cities and which has proved very effective in other towns. Eugene, Short said, reduced its loitering program more than 50 per cent following passage of the measure. Thirty-seven municipalities in Oregon have curfew ordinances and of this number 31 have passed a law similar to the one proposed in Roseburg.

The ordinance will be submitted to the council for passage at the next regular meeting.

Street Vacation Asked

Paul Geddes, representing Paulus Bros., who last year opened a branch cannery in the prune packing warehouse on Winchester street, requested vacation of a stub street, unnamed on the city plat but generally known as Bushey avenue. The street, one-half block long, is unimproved. He stated that the cannery company has purchased the property on both sides of the street and desires the vacation in order to build a structure adjoining the plant now occupied. Action was postponed in order to permit time for a more thorough investigation.

James Bewely, assistant fire chief and fire truck driver, tendered his resignation, announcing he had secured other employment. Jack Toi is serving as substitute driver and it was decided to permit this arrangement to continue while the fire department and board of fire commissioners determine upon a permanent arrangement.

Parking Ban Extended
Because of the traffic congestion on Second Avenue South the road leading east of town along the north side of Deer creek, it was decided to provide a no-parking zone extending from East Third street to the east city limits. The regulations also will be made to include the short street in front of the Hennin Bros., Northside market. The action is necessary, it was stated, to keep the route open for heavy logging traffic.

Councilman Croft reported that progress is being made on the proposal to open a direct route from Second Avenue to the Pacific highway and that a financing plan probably will require a special tax levy to be voted upon by the residents of the city.

An application for package beer license for Bill's Place was approved.

MR. AND MRS. PERRY WRIGHT and their son, Don, now a paratrooper in the Mediterranean country. They live at Illahee, about 56 miles east of Roseburg above the North Umpqua river. Some years ago—40 or more, I think—the Wrights took up a homestead there. It was before Giff Pinchot and Theodore Roosevelt had thought seriously of the forest service, as we know it today.

Perry picked a good spot, on and adjoining a high upland meadow. Since then he's made his living raising cattle, packing and hunting. Perhaps he's a better packer than Mrs. Wright is—knowing 'em both as well as I do I hesitate to say; she's pretty good at packing herself.

Perry's avocation has been hunting panthers, or cougars or mountain lions as you may hap-

pen to have heard them called. He's killed them with 22 calibre rifles, and even with a bow and arrow.

I go to visit the Wrights every now and then, usually in company with an old time friend of theirs, and will stay for dinner and sometimes over night. What meals Mrs. Wright serves! The table groans and has every reason to. So do I, for the same reason: I'm so overloaded. I envy the Wrights. It seems to me that they live the life of the proverbial Riley. Born to friendliness, they have achieved charity and unselfishness and practice all three.

I wish I could stay up there all the time, year in and year out, and split their wood, milk a cow and perhaps lend a hand at skinning a wildcat. Their mode of life is a mighty good one and has my kind liked to a whisper.

Japanese Slain On Kwajalein Isle 8,122

through the coral, nor minute devilfish which lived in holes in the reef."

U. S. Wounded 1,148.

The Kwajalein drive cost the U. S. marine and army forces amazingly fewer casualties than for the successful Gilberts campaign in which 1,092 were killed and 2,680 wounded. The Japanese lost nearly 4,000 men during the November, 1943, fighting. American wounded on Kwajalein totaled 1,148, and 82 men were listed as missing. No compilation on Japanese wounded was available, but 264 enemy troops were taken prisoner.

Washington inclined to the belief that the February 4 sea bombardment of Paramushiro island, Japan's big base in the North Pacific, was intended to distract and confuse the enemy, and was not in itself preliminary to invasion. Yesterday's disclosure of the attack was followed by a Vichy radio announcement that U. S. forces had landed in the Kuriles chain.

Other Jap Bases Raided

Allied bombers ranged far over the Southwest Pacific in raids on Japanese positions. More than 150 planes kept up the continuing attacks on Rabaul, New Britain, where for the second consecutive day the enemy's fighter defense was reported as weak.

Air assaults also were carried out against airdrome and supply areas in the Admiralty islands, Japanese staging base in the Bismarck sea; Tanimbar island, 300 miles north of Darwin, Australia; and Kavieng, New Ireland. American ground forces expanded their position east of Borgen bay at invaded Cape Gloucester, northwest New Britain, while

Germans Bomb Hospital In Italian War Zone

Aigiers radio said. The famous Benedictine monastery rises on the crest of the hill.

Five hundred Germans have been captured by U. S. troops in the Cassino area. The Germans threw strong re-lays of air bombers over the Rome area beachhead, and American fighters intercepted them. Some dropped their bombs on allied troops, but most of the formations were broken up before reaching their objectives.

Headquarters disclosed the Germans had used flame-throwers, tanks, and other weapons in their last major effort against the beachhead—an attack Saturday night west of Cassino.

Twenty-four German planes and two gliders were shot down during the day in all Italian operations, against loss of five allied ships. Heavy artillery barrages continued in the Cassino area, but field reports said the intensity of street fighting in the town itself slackened yesterday, with troops of both sides wearying by battle.

Elsewhere on the Fifth army front there was active patrolling, and a Nazi attack on Mt. Orsogna was beaten off. Two German pa-

Eight army sector ewre repulsed. Allied patrols shot up an enemy gun battery. Allied bombers rained explosives yesterday on German troops and supplies at Cassino, key communications center 26 miles southeast of Rome.

Fighter-bombers also lashed at rail and road targets behind the German lines, the communications said, and attacked rail yards at Viterbo and oil storage tanks at the port of Leghorn.

(By the Associated Press)
London newspapers expressed disappointment over the Italian campaign, suggesting the allies had been over-cautious in pushing the Rome beachhead inland to cut the Apennine and Cassina ways—major German communications to the central battlefields.

Washington was reported uneasy but not alarmed. A British military official there said the allies appeared to be losing some of the initiative. He added that "there has been some disappointment" in our failure to cut the two main roads below Rome.

The Vatican radio protested that armed fascist hoodlums forced their way into St. Paul's basilica, a mile outside the walls at Rome, violating the Vatican's extra-territorial rights. The church was searched from top to cellar and 64 refugees were arrested.

ly renewed its warning to the government of Finland to get out of the war or accept the consequences of continuing to fight on the side of Germany.

The action was the first taken by this government with respect to Finland for sometime and suggested that the Finns might be under an allied diplomatic as well

as military offensive to force them out of the war.

The United States government, Hull said, has recently taken occasion to say to the Finnish government, as it has on a number of occasions in the past, that the responsibility for the consequences of Finland's collaboration with Germany and continuance in a state of war with a number of this country's allies, including the Soviet Union and the British Commonwealth of Nations, must be borne solely by the Finnish government.

Finland meanwhile was further isolated and warned by Moscow that "the hour of reckoning is approaching" and that the double bombing of Helsinki Sunday was but a sample of things to come.
