Dr. Kent Berry Renews Effort to Gain Freedom

SPOKANE, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Dr. Kent W. Berry of Olympia, serving a life sentence in the state prison at Walla Walla for kidnapping and assaulting Irving Baker Aug. 19, 1938, filed a petition in superior court today for his release on a writ of habeas corpus. The petition asserts Berry was being held in prison in violation of his rights under the 14th amendment of the constitution of the United States.

Berry was convicted in November, 1938, and entered prison in 1939. He was denied a writ of habeas corpus last August by the state supreme court.

The current petition repeats allegations by Berry at the trial that the attack on Baker was made at the suggestion of Smith Troy, then Thurston county prosecutor.

It amplifies details of an alleged rape of Mrs. Berry by Baker during a July 4 party at Mud bay in 1938.

Ewing, Wallace Air Demo Views at Portland Banquet

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Election of a republican president and congress next fall would prolong the war and place peace negotiations in the hands of isolationists, Oscar R. Ewing, vice-chairman of the democratic national committee, declared at a Jackson day dinner rally last night.

A republican-controlled foreign affairs committee wrecked mankind's hope for peace after the first World war, he charged, and this committee would "be completely dominated by isolationists" again if the republicans win.

Vice-President Henry A. Wallace, speaking informally at the banquet, criticized the bureau of budget for striking funds for postwar planning by the Bonneville Power administration. He suggested house heating, irrigation and phosphates development as possible new uses for Bonneville power now turning war plants.

Wallace advocated a congressional act providing for loans to industries for setting up hospital and health services for employees similar to those in Henry J. Kaiser shipyards.

A six-hour day, 30-hour week will not be necessary to provide employment for all after the war, he said.

Inflation Menace Cited

Wallace told CIO workers in a tour of shipyards and war plants that a 40-hour week probably would be needed to produce the \$170,000,000,000 worth of goods and services yearly to keep this country on an even keel.

The government probably will have to retain many of its controls over business and consumption up to two years after the war because the greatest danger of inflation will come in that period as it did after the last war, he told an AFL group.

Consumer savings will be 10 times more than last time, he said, predicting a tremendous buying surge.

Wallace said in an interview he favors heavy postwar personal income taxes and lightning the load on corporations, particularly those expanding to provide more employment. New west coast plants which have been unable to amass huge reserves should receive government assistance he said.

Thinks F. D. R. To Run

Wallace declared this country has been sobered lately by the slowness of the Italian campaign. The people, while not complacent, have not been fully aware of the war, he said, adding, however, that the production record has been brilliant.

After notifying reporters he considered the war and politics separate issues, he again remarked that President Roosevelt probably will run for a fourth term, adding quickly that he does not believe the president himself has reached a decision on this.

Of republican chances, he said only, "republicans have a habit of being very helpful to the democrats about election time."

U. S. Labor Trouble Stressed by Japan

Reflecting the close attention with which American labor problems are followed in axis countries, the Tokyo radio broadcast today these two items which the Domei news agency said had been received via Lisbon:

1. "A dispatch from Fall River, Mass., said that the United States army took over operation of seven textile plants last night at the direction of Roosevelt owing to a strike by independent unions which struck against CIO contracts with the mills."

2. "A Kansas City dispatch said that 100 tons of war material lay on docks, in warehouses and on station platforms when 600 truck

drivers employed by 41 companies walked out today protesting the War Labor board's refusal to grant wage increases."

The items, included in the regular Domei news broadcast, were sandwiched between a Tokyo story on the recently concluded diet session and a dispatch purporting to come from Lisbon which declared that the Chinese were growing restive "over the absence of major action against the Japanese in Burma."

The Kansas City truck drivers, members of Local No. 41, an AFL truck drivers' union, returned to work this morning after a 24-hour layoff. Their return was urgently requested yesterday by government officials and an army officer.

They had stopped work in protest of a ruling of the War Labor board's national trucking commission, denying them a 5-cent hourly wage increase. A key rate of 73 cents an hour is in effect. The drivers agreed to return to work pending further negotiations.

Property Tax on Community Basis High Court Issue

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The supreme court has under consideration today arguments in a case affecting the pocketbooks of taxpayers in 10 states with community property statutes.

It is an appeal from a Louisiana state supreme court decision holding unconstitutional a section of the 1942 federal estate tax which does not recognize community property.

Assistant United States Attorney General Samuel O. Clark, Jr., urged a reversal of the Louisiana court decision. He said community property laws worked to the advantage of taxpayers in states having such laws.

He pointed out two states—Oklahoma and Oregon—have adopted community property laws in comparatively recent times, "doubtless having their eye on the (federal) internal revenue code."

Community property laws are also in effect in California, Louisiana, Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Idaho, Nevada, and Washington.

Sutherland Thefts Laid To Four Held Here

Four Sutherland residents, Richard Charles (Nick) Martin, 36; Henry Harold Linch, 18; Charles R. Peaches, 18, and a 15-year-old youth, who was not identified by the police, were in custody here today on larceny charges, State Policeman Sherman Morris reported. They were accused, Morris stated, of the theft of coins from a slot machine and various articles of merchandise from three Sutherland stores. The burglaries were alleged to have occurred at about 8 p. m. Tuesday.

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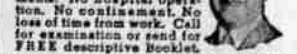
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
