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Senators Caustic In Criticism of Income Tax Forms

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10—(AP)—Members of congress took a shuddering look at the new income tax return blanks today and one of them, Senator "Cotton Ed" Smith, prophesied that the next 34 days would evoke the biggest a-whooping and a-holler-ing yet heard from the taxpayers.

Seldom in human history, they agreed, have so many owed so much with so few chances of figuring out the bad news unaided by a squad of accountants equipped with liquid-cooled slide rules.

Those who stumbled through a searching query about fiduciary income on page 1 of form 1040 bogged down on amortizable bond premiums, page 2. With reflex action, most of the lawmakers at that point tossed the return forms to their cringing secretaries.

Senator Smith, an unrepentant South Carolina democrat, boomed out that it looked to him like the bureaucrats were a-trying to mess up and confuse the people.

"Why, son," he said, "I think those blanks are a crime against the law abiding citizens of this country. I believe one of the senate page boys could make out a better one."

Before Smith had time to point out a likely page boy, a dozen of his colleagues came out in favor of congress itself doing something to simplify the chore of paying federal taxes.

"Tax simplification," declared Senator Byrd (D-Va.), sworn enemy of complicated questionnaires, "is one of the most challenging problems before congress this year."

Senator Wiley (R-Wis.) likened the present blanks to a Chinese puzzle one question in particular on form 1040 aroused the grudging admiration of the legislators for its phrasing. It asks:

"Was the rate of your salary or wages increased or decreased during your taxable year? (Yes or no) . . ."

Senator Radcliffe (D-Md.), the only senator discovered to make out his own return, commented: "Now isn't that a jackass question? Both the man who got a raise and the man whose wages were cut would have to answer 'Yes.'"

Liquor Officials Plan War on Black Market

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 10—(AP)—Evmo M. Beckett, Washington state liquor board chairman, will coordinate the anti-black market activities of the new northwest control agency created by the liquor-monopoly states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Utah.

Assistant coordinators elected at the conference of 50 representatives of the five states yesterday are Ray Conway, Oregon liquor commission administrator, who will be in charge of administration, and James A. Pryde, Washington state patrol chief, who will direct enforcement.

Weyerhaeuser Obtain Coos Bay Logging Spread

NORTH BEND, Ore., Feb. 10—(AP)—The Weyerhaeuser Timber company today took over principal assets of the Coos Bay Logging company and announced intention to extend operations to this area.

The sale included timber holdings, a 10-mile logging road from tidewater on the South Coos river to a logging camp, booming grounds, a mill site and a mile of waterfront property here.

The price and extent of the timber holdings were not announced.

Dr. W. C. Jones, U. of O., To Head Whittier College

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 10—(AP)—Dr. William C. Jones, 43-year-old head of University of Oregon's political science department, will be the next president of Whittier college at Pasadena, Calif.

He announced yesterday his acceptance of the Whittier trustees' offer of the presidency, succeeding W. O. Mendenhall, resigned. He said he would take the position June 1.

Jones received his bachelor of arts degree from Whittier in 1926.

Food Subsidy Plan's Days Seem Numbered

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10—(AP)—Without debate, the senate today adopted an amendment to the food subsidy repeal bill that would permit the existing government price control policy to continue in full effect until June 30.

However, administration hopes of saving the consumer food price subsidy program faded near the vanishing point.

The senate—flaunting pleas by President Roosevelt—voted 49 to 26 yesterday against an amendment which would have authorized \$1,500,000,000 for subsidies in 1944. The vote showed the anti-subsidy forces were close to the two-thirds majority they would need to override an expected presidential veto of legislation to end the program.

Doughboys in England Go "Valentine Mad"

LONDON, Feb. 10—(AP)—Homesick American doughboys are ransacking English shops for valentines and the "more lovin'" the cards are the faster they sell.

The Yanks have gone "valentine mad" said one merchant, adding:

"They want cards with heart-throbs and valentines tricked out with tiny red silk bows and bits of lace in the old-style fashion fairly fascinate them. We've got rid of valentines which have been on the shelf for 10 years."
