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Normal Program Of Scouts Goes on During Wartime

Although Boy Scouts are helping to win the war, no part of the normal program of activities has been suspended for the duration, according to B. C. Elliott, district chairman of Douglas county district of Wallamet area council, Boy Scouts of America.

"The basic fundamentals of scouting are health—physical, mental and moral—and good citizenship," Mr. Elliott said.

"Nothing in the Boy Scout oath and law is any less valuable during peace than it is during war. Patriotism, faith in God, clean living, doing a good turn daily—all of these will be needed more than ever when peace comes."

"Hundreds of the soldiers and sailors who have been decorated for heroism in this war were former scouts. It is estimated that one-third of the officers and enlisted men in Uncle Sam's armed forces were once scouts or scoutmasters. Their training helped to fit them for their jobs, by teaching them teamwork and ability to get along under difficult conditions."

"Scouting doesn't have to 'convert' after the war in the usual sense of the word. All it has to do is proceed with normal Boy Scout activities. The result can be predicted from the records. For in peacetime as well as during war, scout training builds leadership and character. The more boys who become scouts today, the more progress we will make toward world friendship in the postwar period."

Douglas Stockmen Given Advice By O. S. C. Speakers

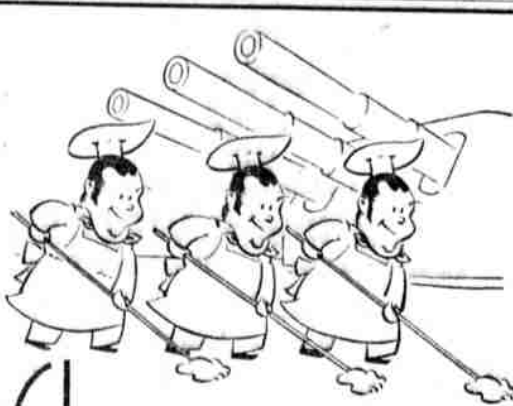
Douglas county livestockmen were advised by Dr. J. N. Shaw, veterinarian at Oregon State college, at a meeting in Roseburg Tuesday that proper feeding of breeding ewes and sheep would eliminate a majority of all troubles commonly found in farm flocks and that good management was essential in any profitable livestock enterprise. Growers were warned to keep livestock numbers in line with available feed supplies by H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandman. It was suggested by the speakers that feeder pigs weighing 100 pounds or more should be fed out if the cost of grain did not exceed \$50 a ton. Weaner pigs under 100 pounds, however, presented a real problem to the producer.

Keen interest was shown by livestockmen in pasture improvement work following motion pictures of pasture improvement work being carried on in Douglas county.

Wallace Warns Big Corporations

SEATTLE, Feb. 10.—(AP)—In a warning to "the managers controlling our great corporations" in the postwar era, Vice-President Henry A. Wallace declared last night that "the people will smash their system unless they are willing to furnish such active leadership in whole-hearted cooperation with labor and government as will prevent serious unemployment."

The vice-president, in the final address of his west coast tour, said that talk of a postwar national income of \$100,000,000,000 a year was setting the goal too low because such a level would leave about 10,000,000 persons unemployed.

"We can't accept that," he asserted.

"In this fight of the people it is quite possible for those who control the big corporations to gum up our system so that it cannot work," he continued. "It is possible for an incipient American fascism to precipitate a depression which will defeat all the desires of labor and government and most of business."

"Personally, I think they are

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too enlightened today to do a thing of that kind. Statements by the presidents of the U. S. chamber of commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers indicate that they realize there has been a great change in the moral as well as the business climate."
