In the Episcopal church of St. Paul's in the Desert, marriage rites were said at eight o'clock Saturday evening, January 8 by candlelight, for Major James Y. The church, flower decked and candlelight for the occasion, lent itself to the colorful gathering of some of the Army's best fighting men.

Lt. Marion McIntosh, ANC, a cousin of the bride, sang, "Because" preceding the ceremony.

The bride entered on the arm of her father, preceded by her maid of honor, Miss Betty Anne Lyons, of Palm Springs. The bridegroom entered from the west porch with the Vicar, the Rev. Robert M. Hogarth, and attended by his best man, Major Francis W. Kell, also of the Headquarters staff, Camp Young. The double ring ceremony was performed.
