EDWIN NIXON IS HONORED ON BIRTHDAY

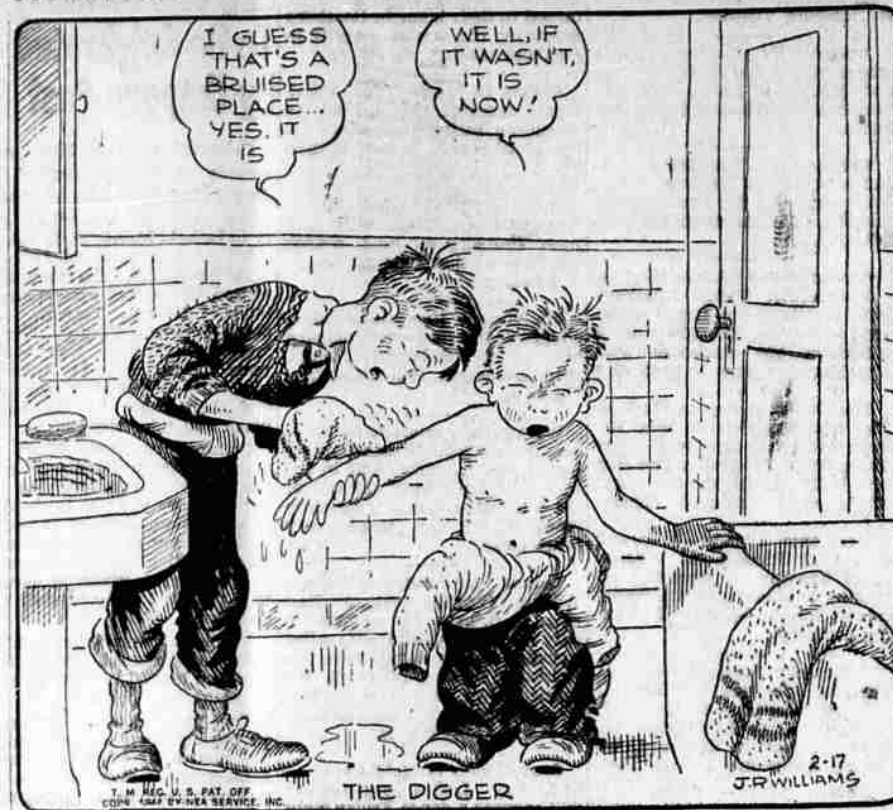

U. of O. Basketeers Again Tounce Vandals

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 16—(AP)—Fading in the final half after playing nip and tuck basketball during the opening period, the Idaho Vandals lost a 57-38 decision to the Oregon Webfoots last night and dropped back into a tie with Oregon States for third place, three full games behind the Oregon five.

Although leading only momentarily in the first half which ended 27-25, the Vandals remained within striking distance until Oregon's height began to tell around the backboards.

George Bray, Oregon forward, captured scoring honors with 21 points while Gano, Idaho center, led the Vandals with 10.

The game concluded Idaho's eight games with the two Oregon schools, both of the southern institutions winning a four-game series.

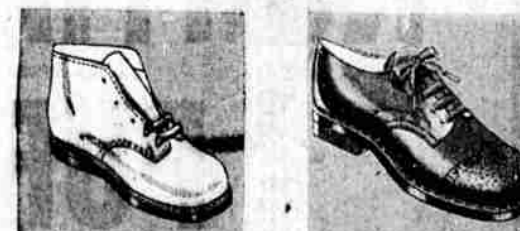
