Douglas Sale of E Bonds Within \$50,000 of Quota

Douglas county's sales of E bonds were reported today by H. O. Pargeter, chairman of the county war finance committee, to be within \$50,000 of the assigned quota for sales to individuals. Although the county has surpassed by a large margin the aggregate quota, the goal of E bond sales has not been reached and every effort is being made, the chairman stated, to put the county over the top in every department.

Pargeter urged continued activity on the part of all war bond salesmen and also urged that persons planning to buy bonds make their purchases at the earliest possible date.

Although the Fourth War Loan campaign will be continued through February, only the sales cleared through the federal reserve bank will be credited. As from two to three days are required to get reports to the federal reserve bank, Feb. 25 will be about the last opportunity to obtain credit for the county in the Fourth War Loan campaign for bonds sold. Pargeter urges that purchases through payroll deductions for the week ending Feb. 26 be made early in the week if possible.

Cops Nab 2 Brothers in Running Gun Battle

GRAND COULEE, Wash., Feb. 18.—(AP)—An alley cat repaid the engineers at Grand Coulee dam for its daily meal of lunch pail scraps, the bureau of reclamation revealed today, by solving the problem of how to string a cable through 500 feet of 24-inch winding drain pipe.

The engineers tied 500 feet of string to the cat's tail and sent it through the pipe, gently encouraged by a blast of air. The string was used to pull a rope through the drain and the cable followed the rope.
