The smoke photographed above is from the Campbell mill at Canyonville. You may draw your own conclusions as to where the mist and fog which blur the picture are from.

The mill cut is something over 40,000 feet daily. About 40 men are employed at the mill and another 15 or 20 in the woods. The company's timber holdings are on Days Creek and constitute a supply ample for many years' run.

Started in 1838 by Fred Cooper, the mill was purchased in 1911 by Mr. Campbell, a Los Angeles lumber dealer. D. W. Gill is its superintendent.
