Alied Bombs Continue To Strafe Reich Plants

with a loss of 15 U. S. bombers—estimated at roughly one and one-half per cent of the force dispatched. Five fighters also failed to return. The escorting Mustangs destroyed 33 Nazi planes and the total probably will climb after the bomber gunners' reports are tabulated.

The raids, in swift follow-up to the 2,200-ton RAF assault on Stuttgart Sunday night, crushed the two aircraft component factories at Brunswick which had been damaged severely by the gigantic U. S. armada Sunday. In addition, targets in Hannover and several large aircraft parks and other targets near the Netherlands border also were attacked.

Among the airdromes hit were those at Bramsche, 75 miles south of Wilhelmshaven; Lingen, 60 miles south of Emden; Vechte; Quakenbruck, 20 miles north of Bramsche; Diepholz, 35 miles southwest of Bremen; and Ahlhorn, 45 miles south of Wilhelmshaven.

Meanwhile, Maj. Gen. Frederick L. Anderson, deputy in charge of the U. S. strategic bombing force in Britain, asserted that Leipzig factories producing 38 per cent of Germany's single-engine fighter planes were knocked out by Sunday's record raid.

Anderson added that the Brunswick plant, producing 30 per cent of the Nazis' twin-engine fighters, likewise was knocked out and that restoration of the factories at Brunswick—without counting yesterday's devastating blows—had been set back "an additional three or four months."

Axis-Tainted Gold No Longer Good in America

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22—(AP) The allies tossed a new economic noose around the necks of Germany, Japan and their satellites today, decreeing that they would not hereafter accept axis-tainted gold from neutral countries.

The U. S. treasury, acting in concert with England and Russia, announced it would refuse to take such gold from any nation and Treasury Secretary Morgenthau stated the United States government would refuse to recognize sales of any gold looted by the axis.
