

Ceiling Prices on Salmon Increased

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22—(AP)—Maximum producer price ceilings of 20 cents a pound for all round chinook salmon caught in California, Oregon and Washington from January through March were established today by the OPA.

The price regulation covers fish caught in ocean trolling operations, and taken in bays, streams and rivers of the three states, with the exception of the Sacramento river.

The previous price was 18 cents for large round troll chinook salmon, and 22 cents for drawn chinook. The new price for drawn chinook is 24 cents a pound.

All April prices for chinook salmon will be established at previous May levels, the OPA also announced.

Ceiling prices for steelhead salmon will be boosted to 12 cents a pound for round fish, up from the previous 10 cents.

Chimneys Must Conform

The ordinance governing the construction of chimneys was placed on first and second readings and will be up for final passage at the next regular meeting. It corrects an omission in the city building code as the latter does not contain specifications covering the building of chimneys and flues. The new ordinance follows the rules of the fire underwriters, requiring that flues and chimneys must be built from the ground, instead of being placed on brackets, and also setting forth the materials to be used, sizes and heights for various purposes.

Also given first and second readings was the ordinance extending the fire zone within which all new construction must be of fireproof materials. Existing buildings are not affected.

The ordinance adds to the zone the section along the railroad track to Rowe street in North Roseburg, and along East First avenue to East Third street, taking in the section now occupied by the Paulus Bros. cannery, the rumo packing plants, etc., along Second Avenue South as far east as East Fourth street and including the property between East First Avenue and Deer creek.

In the south part of town the limits are made to include the property between Stephens and Cobb streets on the east side of the highway and between Stephens and Pine on the west side of the highway, extending south to Rice and South streets.

Street Barrier Asked

Father William Coughlan, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic church, appeared before the council and asked permission to block off Kane street between Oak and Washington streets during 10-minute recess periods morning and afternoon and from noon to 1 p. m. on school days. He reported that due to inability to secure labor and equipment last fall it was not possible to complete construction of a playground adjoining the Catholic school. Recent increases in attendance make more space for play during recess periods essential, he stated, and the children are forced to use the street, and thus are exposed to traffic dangers. He agreed that the school would furnish traffic guards during the closed periods.

The council was reluctant to close the block during the noon hour, due to the large amount of travel and will suggest the use of other sections. The matter was left to the police committee for action. Father Coughlan stated that the request is only for the balance of the school year, as it is expected to complete the playground construction during the coming summer, but that nothing can be done at present due to the fact that the ground is too wet to permit use of the machinery required for the construction job.

Mayor W. F. Harris announced the appointment of Councilman G. C. Finlay as a member of the police committee.

Kuriles Island Bases Of Japanese Bombed

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sunk by allied planes. This new destruction last Saturday and Sunday night brought to 44 the total number of Japanese ships sunk by bombs and guns in the Bismarck archipelago area within a period of one week.

Warships and merchantment of various sizes were included. The largest was a 10,000-ton tanker.

General MacArthur disclosed the latest Japanese shipping losses in a communique that told also of new air assaults on the airdromes around Rabaul, and throughout the Southwest Pacific.

Twenty-six more Japanese planes were shot down bringing the total for one week to 144. Twenty-three of the new Japanese planes losses were over Lunakal airdrome Saturday morning when they sent up 40 or 50 fighters to try to ward off an attack by Dauntless dive bombers and Avenger torpedo planes. Three more were winged by Lightnings escorting Liberator bombers over Torbera airport. Allied plane losses were minor.

Troops Seize Gunboat

Jungle-fighting army troops, moving cautiously up the Itai river at Arave on New Britain's southwest coast, seized a Japanese gunboat, 11 enemy landing craft and a huge pile of Japanese supplies.

The army men were trying to make contact with marines that have established themselves on Borgen bay, and drive the foe from western New Britain.

On New Guinea, 220 more Japanese dead were found by Australian troops cleaning up the northeast coast southeast of Sador after their successful drive up the Huon peninsula coast.

At Wewak, on the northeastern New Guinea coast, allied planes sank a 6,000-ton vessel.

Veto Tosses Tax Bill Back to Congress

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timated the bill would provide \$2,315,000,000 a year). The social security freeze, the president said, would come at a time when industry and labor can best adjust themselves to the increases.

Appeals Proviso Hit He criticized as "inept" a provision for appeals to the tax court, declaring the court did not have personnel to handle the load.

Holding out an offer to approve a bill which would enact the excise taxes provided in the vetoed measure, Mr. Roosevelt referred to these as "wholly unobjectionable" tax increases.

Mr. Roosevelt said it had been suggested to him that he approve the bill on the ground that having asked congress for a loaf of bread he should be content with a small piece of crust. He added:

"I might have done so if I had not noted that the small piece of crust contained so many extraneous and inedible materials."

In assailing special privileges which he said the bill would create, the president catalogued them in this manner:

Permission for corporation reorganized in bankruptcy to retain a high excess profits credit and depreciation basis in inuring to

the benefit of bondholders who, in many cases, bought the bonds in the speculative market. He said it might open the door to further windfall profits in this market.

Percentage depletion allowances, which he termed questionable in any case, now are extended to a number of additional minerals.

The lumber industry is allowed to treat income from timber cutting as a capital gain rather than annual income. As a grower and seller of timber (Mr. Roosevelt raises Christmas trees on his New York estate), the chief executive said he believed timber should be considered a crop and regarded as income when sold.

Natural gas pipelines are exempted from the excess profits tax "without justification" and in a manner which might lead oil companies to ask for similar treatment for pipelines.

Pension Rate To Double

The president's action, strange to say, may mean an increase in taxes of \$1,400,000,000 a year, since the old-age pension payroll tax is due to double automatically on March 1.

The tax bill would "freeze" the tax at the present rates through 1944. But some congressional leaders believe congress will be unable to pass the tax bill over a veto, and that the automatic increase will go into effect.

Reports Urged on Funds For Paralysis Drive

Persons who have been engaged in soliciting funds for the infantile paralysis fund were urged today by Mrs. Gene Mills, chairman, to file their reports as soon as possible. The final report on the campaign, it is stated, is being withheld until several outstanding reports are received.

Future Bombing of Reich To Be Worst of All, Says Churchill in War Review

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American forces will be relatively equal at the outset, if this battle is prolonged "the continuous flow of Americans would make their force the greater."

Italy: The "forces in the bridgehead are well matched," but "we are definitely stronger in artillery and armor" and air power. The fact there are "something like half a million Germans now in Italy is not unwelcome to the allies," giving the opportunity to fight the nazis. "We have sufficient forces at our disposal in Africa to nourish the struggle as fast as they can be transported across the Mediterranean."

Japan: The air power of Japan also is being overmatched and worn down, and Japan's production is "incomparably small compared with that of the great powers Japan has assailed."

Sea Tolls Compared

Naval: British action alone has sunk 19 enemy warships and many auxiliaries since January 1, 1943, and half the U-boats known to have been destroyed, and was largely responsible for sinking 315 enemy merchantmen. The Royal navy in the same period lost 95 warships by disablement, and 7,677 officers and men of the royal navy, and 4,200 of the merchant marine.

Yugoslavia: Marshal Josip Broz (Tito) and his partisans more than 250,000 strong are engaging at least 14 of the 20 German divisions in the Balkans.

Britain is intensely interested in maintaining Poland's independence, the prime minister continued, and is convinced that repeated Moscow declarations for a strong, independent Poland

"represent the settled policy of the soviet union." "I have intense sympathy for the Poles but I also have sympathy with the Russian standpoint," he added.

"I cannot feel that Russia's demand for reassurance about her western frontier goes beyond the limits of what is reasonable or just."

Foreign Secretary Eden is working with the Poles seeking a working agreement pending a postwar boundary settlement, the prime minister continued.

Backs Russian View

Speaking of his "sympathy for the Russian viewpoint" in regard to Poland, Churchill said: "Twice in her lifetime, Russia has been violently assaulted by Germany. Many millions of Russians have been slain and vast tracts of Russian soil have been devastated as the result of repeated German aggression. Russia has the right of reassurance against future attacks from the west and we are going all the way with her to see that she gets it, not only by the might of her arms, but by approval and assent of the united nations."

"The liberation of Poland may presently be achieved by Russian armies after these armies have suffered millions of casualties in breaking the German war machine."

Marshal Stalin and I also spoke and agreed upon the need for Poland to obtain compensation at the expense of Germany

both in the north and west."

No Slavery Planned

He declared that "unconditional surrender does not mean the German people will be enslaved or destroyed."

"It means, however, that the allies will not be bound to them at the moment of surrender by any pact or obligation," Churchill said. "There will be no question, for instance, of the Atlantic charter applying to Germany as a matter of right and baying territorial transferences or adjustments in enemy countries."

"No such arguments will be admitted by us, as they were used by Germany after the last war, saying that they surrendered in consequence of President Wilson's 14 points. Unconditional surrender means that the victors

will have a free hand. It does not mean that they are entitled to behave in a barbarous manner, nor that they wish to blot out Germany from among the nations of Europe."
