One of the serious complaints of the ministry of Jesus, is found in Luke's gospel: "This man receiveth sinners, and eateth with them." Eating is a social act, and when we sit at the table with people, we proclaim them to be our friends. By that very act He proclaimed them to be His friends. And He commands us, as His disciples to look upon all men as our friends, ministering to them in His name, because they are His friends. "A man that hath friends must show himself friendly and there is one friend that never fails." Pity the man who has to say, "I have no friend." Friendship ties up with God. Amen.

SEATTLE, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Detective Capt. Marshall Scraft said Floyd W. Miles, 57, former police man, accidentally strangled his son, Russell, 28, early today when he applied a full-nelson, a wrestling hold, to overpower the son and defend himself from attack.

The son, a shipyard worker, was "crazed with liquor," his widow and stepbrother, David C. Wall, 16, told police and attacked the father, a transit system employee, without provocation. "He didn't mean any harm," said the widow of Russell. "He just never grew up. He probably would have killed all of us."

Pelicans Gain Loop Lead by 2nd Win Over R. H. S. Quint

The Roseburg Indians were victims of a farewell celebration for two of the veterans of the Klamath Falls high school basketball team last night, Welch and Conroy, stars of the Pelican squad, leave Thursday for military service and played their last high school game Tuesday night; so celebrated the event by leading the Pelicans to a 69 to 26 victory over the Indians, the two players accounting for 37 of Klamath Falls' score. They were permitted to play the entire game.

The victory gave Klamath Falls the lead in the Southern Oregon conference, but Ashland still has a chance for a tie by beating Medford Friday night. Medford won last night from Grants Pass, 42 to 23. In the district to the north, Springfield extended its lead by a 39 to 35 win over Junction City, one of the closest games the Millers have had this season.

Oversubscription of 4th War Loan Mounting

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—(AP)—The \$14,000,000,000 Fourth War loan has been oversubscribed by \$1,884,000,000—and the figures are not complete. Another week's tabulation of sales remains before a final accounting can be made.

Treasury Undersecretary Daniel W. Bell announced the latest total today, together with a breakdown showing that small purchasers subscribed for an aggregate of \$2,585,000,000 in "E" bonds. He expressed confidence that the \$3,000,000,000 quota for "E" bonds would be met when the final figures are tabulated. Total purchases by individuals of all types of securities, however, stood at \$4,562,000,000, or nearly \$1,000,000,000 short of the \$5,560,000,000 individual goal.
