Lag in Buying of E Bonds Worries Chiefs of Drive

Fourth War Loan workers and committee members were beginning to show signs of worry today because of the lag in purchases of E bonds. While the sales are making a slight daily advance the county is still \$25,000 short of the goal and unless the rate of buying improves greatly today and Friday there is danger the mark will not be reached. H. O. Fargeter, chairman of the county war finance committee said today.

Dr. E. E. Borling, chairman of the Fourth War Loan campaign, is urging an extra effort by all workers to continue their activities through the week.

Douglas county has surpassed its goal for total sales having a record of 134.5 per cent of quota. This, however, includes 212.9 per cent of the quota for sales to corporations. The percentage of E bond sales stands at 89.2, while sales to individuals in all departments amount to 99.4 per cent of quota.

Child Fire Victim Kin Of Myrtle Creek Folk

MYRTLE CREEK — Mr. and Mrs. Trow Wallace have returned to Myrtle Creek from Cascadia, Oregon, where they were called Friday by the death of Helen Van Horn, aged four years, who died from accidental burns. The child was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Huey Van Horn, former Myrtle Creek residents, who moved recently to Cascadia. Mrs. Van Horn is a niece of Mrs. Wallace. The child had donned one of her mother's dresses and was playing in front of the fireplace. Her clothing caught fire, enveloping her in flames. An older sister, Doreen, tore away the child's clothing, the mother having gone to the nearby mailbox, but the burns resulted in death within an hour after the accident.

Surviving are the parents, the sister, and a brother, Ray Van Horn.
