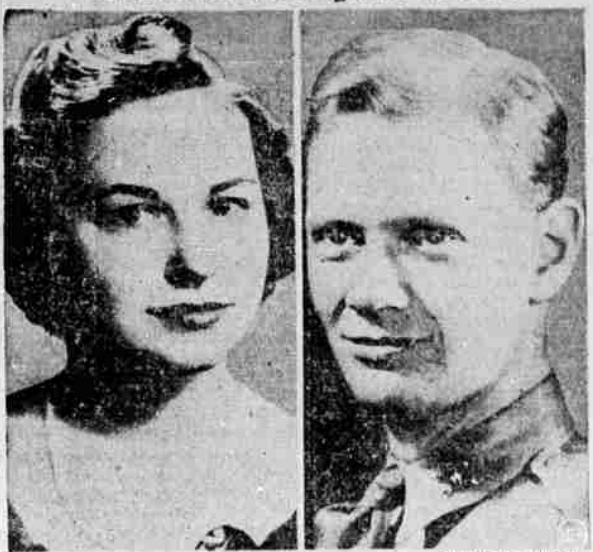

Matthew Adams, Pioneer Resident Of Douglas, Dies

Matthew (Mack) Adams, 79, pioneer resident of Douglas county, died last night at Mercy hospital following a major operation. He was born near Oakland, Oregon, October 23, 1864, the son of Matthew and Serena Adams, pioneer settlers of Douglas county, and attended Wilbur academy. For a short time he made his home in southeastern Washington, returning to Douglas county about 50 years ago to engage in farming on South Deer creek. He was married to Ida Amelia McLaughlin at Roseburg, in October, 1892. Mrs. Adams passed away in October, 1927. In September, 1934, he was married to Mrs. Anna Craig, who died in March, 1938. He has made his home in Roseburg with his son, Dale Adams, since 1938, and was employed by the Umpqua dairy until he was suddenly taken ill last week.

Mr. Adams was a life-long member of the Baptist church and was for 27 years a member of the South Deer Creek grange. He is survived by four children, Frederick D. Adams, Medford; Mrs. Eula Fay Frey, Bell, California; Matthew M. Adams, Alsea; and I. Dale Adams, Roseburg. He is also survived by a sister and three brothers, Mrs. Amanda McConnell, and George Adams both of Roseburg; James H. Adams, Dillard, and John Adams, Lewiston, Idaho. Five grandchildren also survive.

The body has been removed to the Douglas funeral home and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 25. — (AP) — An extensive market in the sale of selective service classification cards is being operated in Oregon, state selective service headquarters said today.

The cards, hundreds of which were obtained in Portland, are stolen by pickpockets through the theft of wallets. Portland police have recovered many of the wallets, with the cards missing. The wallets then are turned over to state selective service headquarters for forwarding to their owners.

The ring operating the racket sells the cards to men who failed to register for the draft.

War Medals to be Conferred in Rite At Oakland High

Military decorations will be conferred at a ceremonial at the Oakland high school Monday, February 28, upon a veteran of the first World war and upon the grandmother of a soldier of the current war, the soldier being a prisoner of war. The ceremonial is being sponsored by Sutherlin-Oakland post of the American Legion.

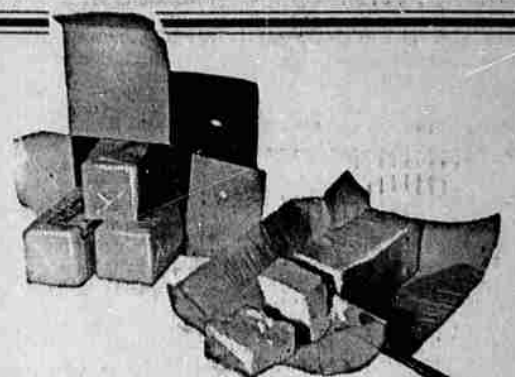
Clyde Applebee, a member of the Sutherlin-Oakland post, will be awarded the Military Order of the Purple Heart for wounds received in action in France during 1918. The presentation will be made by Major B. P. Cody, U. S. recruiting and induction service, who will be accompanied by Ray Dorris, national junior vice-commander of the Order of the Purple Heart, and Past Patriot Commander McEntee, all of Portland.

The second decoration will be awarded at the same ceremony and will include presentation of the Air Medal with two oak-leaf clusters to Mrs. Ellen Dunlap, Sutherlin. Mrs. Dunlap is the grandmother of Staff Sergeant Miles L. Cooley, a waist gunner of a flying fortress shot down over Germany, now held as a prisoner of war. The presentation will be made by Charles W. Zeiser, commanding officer of the Corvallis air field.

The ceremonial will be open to the general public.
