

Morse Stresses Need of Efficient Foreign Policy

A foreign policy designed to promote and enforce the peace and supported by military and naval establishment adequate to "fulfill the pledges that we make, taking into consideration also the support of present and future allies," was urged here Thursday by Dr. Wayne Morse, ex-dean of the University of Oregon law school. Dr. Morse was the speaker at a luncheon meeting of the Roseburg Rotary club. The program was opened by the Rotarians to the general public and a large number of visitors accepted the invitation to hear the speaker, who is to be a candidate for United States senator from Oregon.

Speaking on the topic of "International Good Will," the fourth objective of Rotary, Dr. Morse declared that the cessation of hostilities will not remove the "nationalistic snarls and the cherished hatreds of centuries."

Good Policy Hoped For

"However," he declared, "I feel there is reasonable ground for hope that with a vigorous and energetic policy adopted by the victor nations, these problems will be solved in a more intelligent way than before, that we can turn the vast energies of mankind into channels of peaceful agriculture, trade and commerce, which creates the real wealth of every nation."

Criticizing the lack of sound foreign policies in the years preceding the current war, the speaker pointed out that "had we had a really sound foreign policy, there would have been no attack on Pearl Harbor."

"Never again," he said, should we find ourselves committed to a war, as we have been twice in a generation, unprepared and unready, compelled to fight at an extravagant cost not only in money and economic dislocation, but also in the lives of young men."

Isolation Policy Costly

"He reviewed national history showing the effect of treaties and alliances in the extension of territory and pointed out that after gaining the Philippine islands, 'our country adopted a policy of isolation of the Philippine islands with the most tragic consequences.' Potential enemy nations were permitted to secure mandated territory surrounding the islands while the United States failed to provide adequate protection."

"The army and navy," he said, "reported year after year that the Philippine islands could not be defended successfully for a period to exceed 30 days. This may make more clear to us all the tremendous gallantry and the extraordinary feat accomplished by General MacArthur who, in an absolutely hopeless cause, forced a powerful enemy to spend six months to subjugate these islands. The fact remains that we owe this to the personal heroism of our troops and of our officers, and not to the care or forethought that a responsible government and people should have exercised in regard to land under its own flag and protection."

No International WPA

While denouncing isolationism, Dr. Morse also pointed out that "it is equally preposterous to decide that we should constitute ourselves a benevolent Granddaddy to the entire world by establishing some sort of international WPA after the war. We must not let the beautiful and loudly trumpeted idealism of certain members of the New Deal blind our judgment on this score. We cannot Tammany-ize the entire globe, even with our abundant resources."

He recommended a sound foreign policy, an adequate military establishment bearing a "reasonable proportion to national treaty obligations and commitments and home security and a wise and considered choice of allies," as the best assurance for future peace.

The speaker was introduced by Ed Loney, chairman of the Rotary club's committee on international service. Special honors were paid by the club to three of its members, Dexter Rice, Jim Myers and George Marshall, who celebrate birthdays during April and for whom a birthday cake was served.

Soil Protection In Higher Yields Cited in Program

Production practices which will yield immediate increases while giving maximum protection to soil resources of Douglas county farmlands are stressed in Oregon's Triple A conservation program for 1944. Leo Sparks, member of the county AAA committee, announced this week.

Sparks views as an important feature of the new program the removal of limitations on practices which individual farmers can carry out to earn payments. The only exceptions are for application of lime and phosphate, for which the maximum payment will be \$2 per acre of cropland and orchard or \$25 per farm, whichever is larger.

The committeemen explained that "soil-building allowances," formerly based on each farm's orchard, range and cropland acreages, have been eliminated in the 1944 program. This will allow one operator who has an extensive conservation job to do, such as control of noxious weeds, to earn practice payments on the entire acreage involved. Another operator who carries out no practices will not tie up funds which otherwise would be obligated for his farm.

The reason for the change, the committeemen continued, is to permit maximum results in increased production for war from the \$300,000,000 allocated by congress for conservation. Except for carrying out "special services" such as machinery rationing, allocation of copper wire, lumber and other farm supplies, feed distribution, farm gasoline recommendations, dairy feed payments and other wartime programs, the

entire efforts of AAA will be concentrated this year on increasing production through soil-building and conservation practices.

There will be no special crop payments, such as previously made for wheat and potatoes, and the crop insurance program on wheat also has been suspended through lack of appropriations. Commodity loans on wheat, barley, peas and potatoes, and other price-supporting programs will be continued if they are authorized in legislation now under consideration in congress.

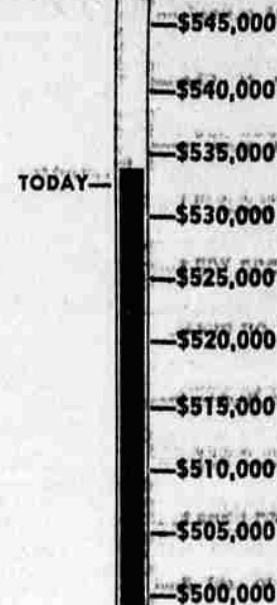
