Patricia Travers, above, violinist, who will be heard in concert in Roseburg at the Junior high school building at 8:15 o'clock March 15, will be the second guest artist to be presented this first season of the Community Concert association. She was born in Allwood, N. J., and started the study of violin at the age of four. For three years she studied with Jacques Gordon of the Gordon String quartet, and then with Hans Letz of the Juilliard Graduate school of Music in New York.

Preceding her official debut on the Ford Sunday Evening Hour, Patricia had played annual concerts at Music mountain, Conn., since she was six years old, and had been soloist with the Brooklyn Symphony orchestra. Her appearance on the Ford broadcast with the Detroit Symphony orchestra established her as a serious artist of the highest rank, worthy to take her place in the list of soloists of radio's chief symphonic hour, which includes Tagstad, Pons, Heifetz, Crooks, Hofmann, practically all the great singers and instrumentalists of the day.
