DR. CHARLES A. EDWARDS

These are days of shadows. The common lot of humanity just now seems to be sorrow, disappointment, despair, and gloom. But as Christians, we have a refuge. We may dwell "under the shadow of the Almighty," and that shadow is a protection and a blessing, just as the weary desert traveller, scorched by the sun, welcomes the shadow of a great rock in the desert sands. That was likely the thought of the Psalmist. Let us also remember that even the shadows of our afflictions can have virtue. There is never a shadow unless there is a light. The shadows are a witness to the light. For the moment it may be that some obstruction prevents us from rejoicing in the rays of that light, but we know that the light is shining because we can see the shadow. We rejoice in what light we receive, and we thank God for the shadows which betoken the full light of day. In early morning the shadows are long, they betoken the beginning of the day. The Psalmist wrote for the comfort of God's people, "Though I walk through the Valley of the Shadow of Death, I will fear no evil, for thou art with me." He that dwells in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty. Amen.
