Argument, Sentiment, Comment

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26—The news of the death of Senator McNary was a great shock. We had been hearing encouraging reports which seemed to indicate a complete recovery. Then, suddenly came this announcement with its stunning finality—and subject to no revision or reconsideration.

I had been acquainted with Senator McNary for many years. But it was not until I became a member of Oregon's delegation in congress that I really came to know the senator. He was truly a great man—a statesman, amazingly keen in mind, kindly and good humored.

The loss to Oregon and to the nation is great indeed. This would be true at any time, but now, when able and experienced leadership is so greatly needed, the passing of Senator McNary is a serious blow. The senator knew the intricate senate rules and was always on hand to clarify problems and straighten out tangles of procedure. His facility for sharp and lucid explanations of complicated measures was remarkable.

Leader of the republican members of the senate, Senator McNary also had the full confidence of members of the opposition. He was liked and admired by every member of the senate. In fact, I am sure it is not the slightest exaggeration to say that Senator McNary was the most loved and highly respected member of the entire congress. Only three members of the senate have served in
