Phone Co. Boosts
Gift to Red Cross

The Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company is contributing \$130,000 to the 1944 Red Cross war fund, according to an announcement by N. R. Powley, president, just received by W. M. McEachern, manager here.

"Our contribution exceeds by more than 50 per cent the \$85,000 we gave last year," President Powley said. "In contributing \$130,000 this year, it has been our earnest endeavor to subscribe as liberally as possible to assist in meeting the added needs for the Red Cross as expressed by its increased budget for 1944."

The company's 1944 Red Cross apportionment, based on the relationship of the county quotas to war fund contribution has been the total quota, to the counties which it serves in Oregon, Washington, California, Nevada and Idaho. On this basis Douglas county's allocation was \$150, and a check for this amount was turned over to the local chapter campaign chairman today by Mr. McEachern.

British Sub Destroys
Jap Airplane Carrier

by Tokyo radio in a broadcast to China and not for home consumption. In the Tokyo version, the Admiralty landing force "was entirely wiped out," seven or eight U. S. ships were sunk and more than 230 soldiers killed. An allied landing attempt on Manus Island was reported and the "enemy was again inflicted heavy losses."

Significantly, U. S. government monitors said they have heard no Tokyo radio report to the Japanese homeland concerning the Admiralty operations.

The allied communiqué also reported a 153-ton bombing raid on Rabaul Monday without meeting air opposition, and other strikes against New Guinea coastal bases.

Other airmen, operating from central Pacific bases, blasted Wake Island Monday for the 14th time since the former U. S. possession fell to the Japanese after the Pearl Harbor attack. Navy bombers probably destroyed six parked enemy planes.

Three enemy-held atolls in the eastern Marshall Islands were hit by army and navy planes and Nauru, phosphate-producing island west of the Marshalls, was raided by a navy search plane.

Japanese shipping in the Pacific, already hard hit by American planes and ships, has suffered additionally from attacks by a small fleet of Dutch submarines, heroic remnants of a naval force virtually wiped out during the Japanese drive through the Dutch East Indies in 1942.

Capt. L. G. L. van der Kun, former chief of staff of the Netherlands naval forces in the Pacific, revealed in Washington Dutch submarines sank 55,000 tons of enemy shipping in 20 months off the Dutch East Indies "despite the fact we could average only two submarines in operation at one time."

Japanese forces in Burma, who van der Kun said must be supplied 90 per cent by water route from Tokyo, lost the town of Makaw in the north. Chinese troops but offered stiffening resistance to other allied forces driving down the Kalamand valley.

U. S. and RAF fliers ranged over most of Burma Monday and Tuesday, hitting communications, transport and troop concentrations.

Noted Cathedral Scene
Of Mysterious Murder

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2. — (AP) — What police called murder in the Washington cathedral provided them with a bizarre mystery today as they sought to solve the death of Miss Catherine Cooper Reardon, 37, assistant librarian of the cathedral, whose battered body was found in the library stacks.

Miss Reardon had been missing from home since late yesterday after telling her mother that she was "going out for a while."

Her body, brutally beaten, was found early today. She was clad only in a slip.

The Washington cathedral is a \$300,000 Episcopal institution which overlooks the capital from high ground in northwest Washington. The bodies of former President Woodrow Wilson, Admiral George Dewey and other famous Americans rest in its crypt.

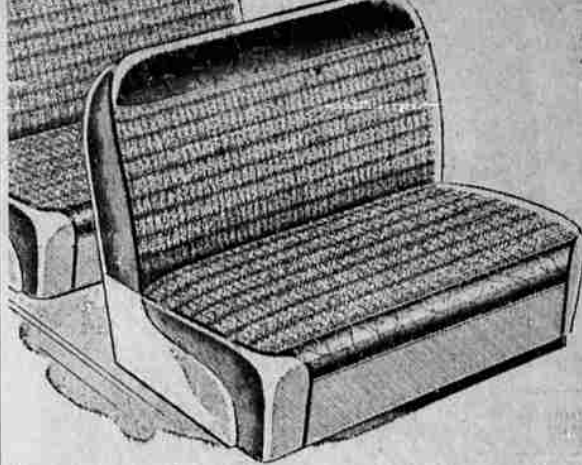

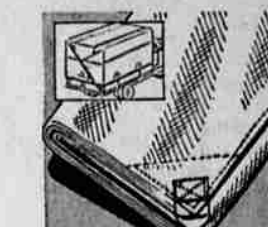

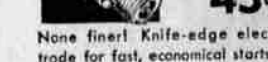
