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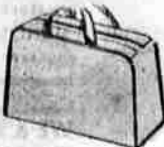

SUTHERLIN — The Sutherlin Girl Scouts are proud to receive a letter from Major Millikin of Fort Mason. Their efforts in collecting magazines for the soldiers will be redoubled as time passes. The American Legion Post 121 of Sutherlin and Oakland play a very essential part in this work by paying the freight charges on all magazines collected. The girls locate the magazines, collect, sort and box them and prepare them for shipment. They have shipped two allotments and are beginning to collect for the third shipment. Magazines that appeal to boys and men are the only ones collected—Life, Time, Readers Digest, Colliers, Saturday Evening Post, Cosmopolitan, western stories, detective stories comic books and other out-of-door stories. Anyone having used magazines that they would like to ship, please notify any girl scout and they will be taken. They must be in good condition.

Major Millikin reported by letter to the Sutherlin scouts that he had received five boxes of magazines from Sutherlin and thanked the girls for their help. He stated he was unable to fill the many requests for magazines asked for by soldiers overseas. He also stated that at present he had an order from a chaplain in Australia asking for 50,000 magazines and to date he reports that he is only able to supply half that amount.

BUILDING FUND IS STARTED AT SUTHERLIN

SUTHERLIN — The Boy and Girl Scout troops of Sutherlin are faced with the problem of finding quarters suitable to carry on their activities and keep their equipment.
