War Food Agency Opened at Eugene

Eugene officially became the center of activities of the office of distribution, War Food administration, for 14 southern Oregon counties on March 3, with the opening of an area office in room 216 Broadway building. Carl G. Izett has been appointed as area supervisor by C. R. Tulley, state supervisor.

Counties included in Mr. Izett's area are Benton, Coos, Crook, Curry, Deschutes, Douglas, Jackson, Jefferson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Lincoln and Linn.

Establishment of three area offices in the state is part of the program of the office of distribution to decentralize operations and to place greater authority locally in handling those war time food problems which require O. D. action.

The office of distribution, an agency of the War Food administration, is held broadly responsible for the government's part in the management of the nation's food supply after it has left the farms. Regulations affecting processors, slaughter plants, dairy plants, canneries, etc., as well as food distributing agencies, are administered by this agency. Problems of area food shortages and surpluses, school lunch programs, support price programs, lend-lease purchases, and the encouragement of food conservation and preservation are some of the programs to be handled by the Eugene office.

Izett stated that he would confer and work closely with state, county, city officials and local offices of other federal agencies, as well as producer distributors and consumer groups, toward the objective of complete utilization of this area's food supply.

Batch of Offenders Fined in Justice Court

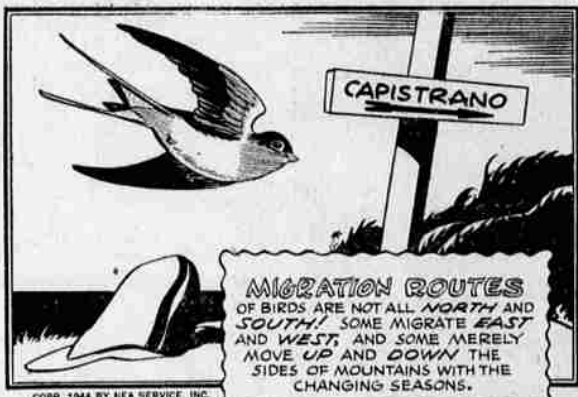

The India-China wing of the air transport command is the U. S. army air force unit which flies the famous north Burma "hump" of the Himalaya mountains, delivering quantities of freight from India to China for use of the American and Chinese forces in China. This aerial link is virtually China's only supply line from the outside world.
