SAVE THOSE TURK EGGS

At 30c per, nobody is going to deliberately ruin any turkey eggs. But many do get broken, and many get too dirty, when a little planning might help.

We suggest that you gather eggs several times a day. It takes a little time, but really takes less time to gather eggs every hour than to clean them if you gather only once a day. Then they look nicer, you can feel proud of them, you save many a broken egg, and the buyer doesn't mind paying such a high price.

Use lots of litter in the nests. Personally, we like saw dust. Four or five inches deep in the nests, and scattered all round in front of the nests, so the hens can get their feet clean.

Nests should be very roomy. Some of the most successful nests we have seen are simply long troughs six or eight inches deep two feet wide and four to eight feet long. With four or five inches of sawdust, chaff, rice hulls or some such litter, and with frequent gathering, you can get most of your eggs in good condition.

FEED ECONOMY AND SANITATION

Nobody makes any profit on wasted feed. This is true in years when feed is plentiful, of course, as well as in this year when feed is very scarce, and may get even more so.

One of the principal methods of wasting feed is in filling feed hoppers too full, and having them so close to the litter that chicks scratch them full of litter so they have to be cleaned and the remaining feed thrown away. This applies mostly to chick feeding, but is also true to some extent with mature birds.

Here is a suggestion which if followed will save a lot of feed, will save labor and litter and improve sanitation. In turn of course, you will have better and healthier pullets at less cost.

Built slatted (or wire covered), if you can get wire, platforms, and place all feed troughs and water fountains on these platforms after the first two or three days. These platforms may be built by nailing half inch strips a half inch apart on frames of 2x2 or 2x4.

Deep feeders filled half full will save feed, but shallow feeders filled to the top encourages wasted feed. We suggest the pastboard feeders for the first three or four weeks, for both chicks and pullets. After that time, they can eat from large roummy feeders deep enough to hold a lot of feed, and equipped with reels or other devices to prevent feed waste.

RHS Beaten By Pelicans; Ashland Defeats Medford

Three basketball games on successive nights proved two and one-half too many for the Roseburg high school Indians, who were beaten 51 to 39 by Klamath Falls Saturday night in the consolation game at the district No. 2 tournament at Ashland.

Roseburg had played two hard games Thursday and Friday, beating Grants Pass for the right to enter the tournament and then playing the most sensational contest of the tournament Friday night when the Indians were beaten by Ashland by only two points.

Ashland went ahead Saturday night to trim Medford 32 to 21 to win the district championship and will enter the state tournament at Salem.

Pelicans Given Hard Tilt.

Exhausted by the long grind, and lacking in reserve strength, the Indians made a game out of Saturday night's contest for the first half playing the Pelicans on even terms with the score tied six times during the first two periods. Klamath Falls held a half-time lead of 24 to 22.

Midway in the third period, however, the Indians slowed to a walk and could not muster the energy to keep pace with the Pelicans. Palmer, a Klamath Falls substitute, who has warmed the bench throughout most of the season, proved the sensation of the contest, rolling up 20 points after he entered the game in the second quarter.

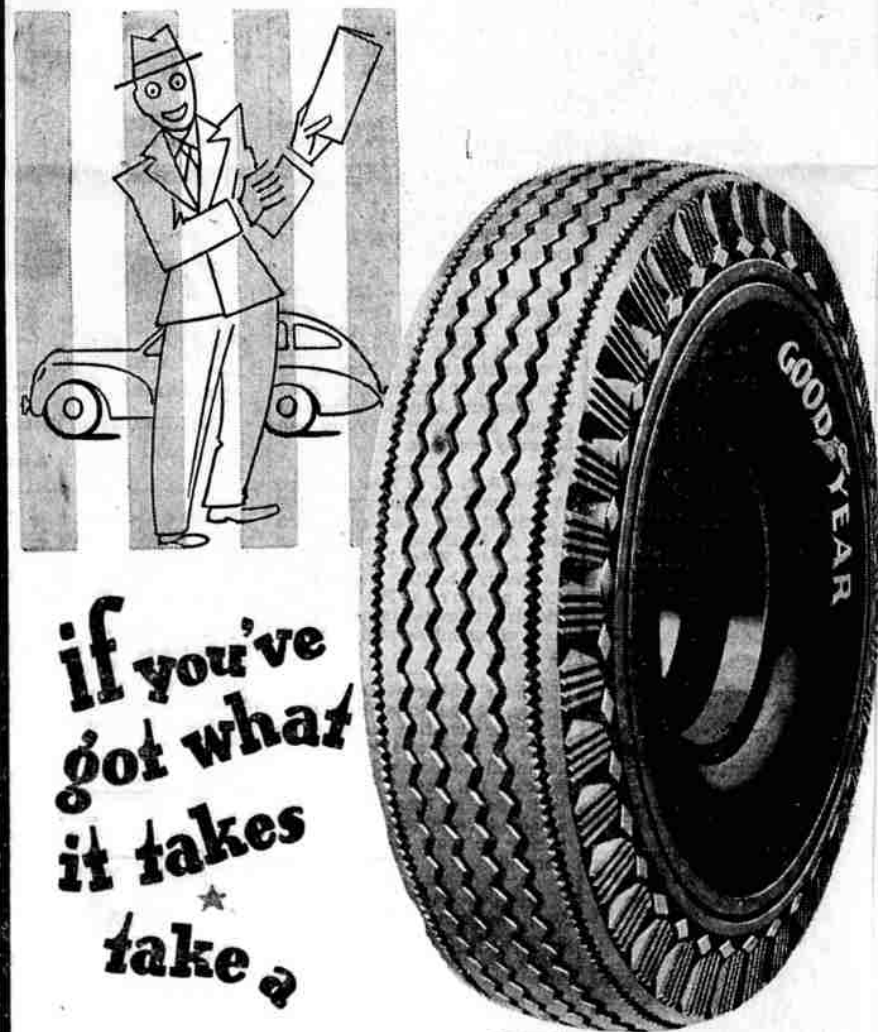
Two On All-Star Team.
