

Draft Deferments Review in Oregon Ordered of Boards

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 6—(AP)—All Oregon draft boards have been ordered by State Selective Service Director Wooton to review all occupational deferments in order to divert men from agriculture and industry into the armed forces.

Wooton asked that particular attention be given to taking men under 26 years old who have occupational deferments.

The colonel said that the order, which is in line with orders given by national selective service headquarters, would not get many men for the armed forces, because Oregon has been tough about granting deferments. He said some men, however, would be obtained from agriculture.

Oregon has met its draft quotas, the colonel said, by being severe, although many states have failed to meet their quotas.

An Associated Press survey last week showed that Oregon was the only western state to meet its quotas, and it is one of only four in the nation to have met them.

The colonel declined to say how many men are being drafted, but no increase in Oregon is expected. Some states which have not met their quotas have been given far bigger quotas for the next few months.

A later sweep of navy fighters over Rabaul Saturday, however, drew up eight Japanese planes, the first to oppose allied blows at the base since February 17. The navy pilots knocked down one enemy plane and probably another, and destroyed or damaged 14 barges and small craft in the bay.

Airdromes at the enemy base at Hollandia, on the north New Guinea coast, were hit with 34 tons of bombs from Liberators. Wewak, down the coast, received 88 tons on an airdrome, where 16 planes were destroyed on the ground.

Three enemy bombers and a fighter were destroyed by allied aircraft striking at Aitape and Hansa bay. Divebombers dropped 30 tons of explosives on enemy positions at Mindiri, near Saidor. Three barges were destroyed and two others damaged by allied fighter planes in the Madang coastal area.

FIRST U. S. TROOPS IN BURMA SCORE VICTORY

NEW DELHI, Mar. 6—(AP)—Jungle-hardened American soldiers—some of them veterans of Guadalcanal and the Southwest Pacific—have gone into action in Burma, the first American ground forces fighting as a unit on the Asiatic continent.

The Americans made a great looping attack far to the left of

Chinese forces operating in the Hukawng valley, and have struck the Japanese lines nearly 10 miles behind their present front lines.

The Americans inflicted heavy casualties on the Japanese in capturing Walawbum, eight miles southeast of Malingkwan, chief village in the valley, by an encircling movement.

With capture of Walawbum and Malingkwan, which fell to the Chinese a Chinese-American pincer has been established around an estimated 2,000 Japanese.

CHUNGKING, Mar. 6—(AP)—American Mitchells of the 14th air force, escorted by fighters, destroyed from 30 to 50 enemy aircraft in the air and on the ground in a raid on Kingshan airdrome in the northern part of Hainan island Saturday, a communique from Lt. Gen. Stilwell's headquarters said today.

The Mitchells also struck the airdrome at Chengmai in northern Thailand today and destroyed eight twin-engine and one single-engine aircraft on the ground.

Fighter pilots of the Chinese-American wing claimed 13 Japanese planes definitely shot down in the raid on Hainan island while American pilots were credited with four, besides a number damaged.

Other Mitchells on a Lightning-escorted sweep up the Yangtze river sank a river freighter and a tanker and shot down four more Japanese fighters.

Japanese airmen bombed an advanced American airdrome near Suichuan, the communique said. One allied plane was lost in all the operations.
