Personal Business Poses Problem for Guy Cordon

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7—(AP)—Guy Cordon, U. S. senate appointee from Oregon, is puzzled as to how to arrange his personal business. He made the statement yesterday during a brief visit to the office of the late Senator McNary, whom he is to succeed.

He came to the nation's capital recently as a representative of 18 counties to support a bill establishing an administrative procedure for a large timber acreage. In addition, he said, he recently formed a partnership with Frank Siever of Portland and they are maintaining law offices in both Roseburg and Portland. He left the offices without provision for an extended stay.

It is doubtful if Cordon will take over Senator McNary's offices inasmuch as they connect with the minority caucus room.

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
