MUSIC TEACHERS TO MEET FRIDAY

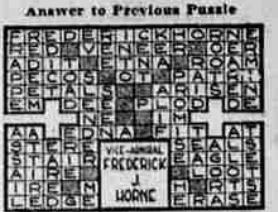
