CANYONVILLE—The Canyonville high school basketball team defeated Days Creek 21 to 19 in a double overtime game played here Tuesday night. Canyonville came from behind in the last quarter, after Days Creek had led all the way, to tie the count at 19-all at the end of the regular playing period. Neither team was able to score in the first five-minute overtime period. In the second period, the game went nearly three minutes before Hamlin, Canyonville center, intercepted a Days Creek pass and soloed down the floor to score the winning basket.

The Days Creek girls made the honors all even by winning the volleyball game by a wide margin.

Corvallis high school last night became the fifth team in the state tourney by beating Mount Angel, 30 to 26, for two successive wins in the scheduled three-game series. Corvallis broke a tie in the last minute of play to win the contest.

While Springfield and Marshfield are battling at Roseburg, tonight, Newberg and Oregon City will be settling the District 7 honors.

Bend, Burns, Hood River and Prineville start a two-day playoff at Bend tonight to decide the issue in District 8.

Tonight's game at the Roseburg gymnasium will pit two excellent teams in a crucial game. On the strength of showings by the respective teams against the Roseburg Indians, Springfield is given a decided edge, having trimmed the Indians 53 to 22 while Marshfield had difficulty in beating Roseburg 35 to 32. Marshfield, however, displayed increased power as the season advanced.

Return games will be played next Thursday in Myrtle Creek. Proceeds will be for the benefit of the Myrtle Creek Boy Scout troop.

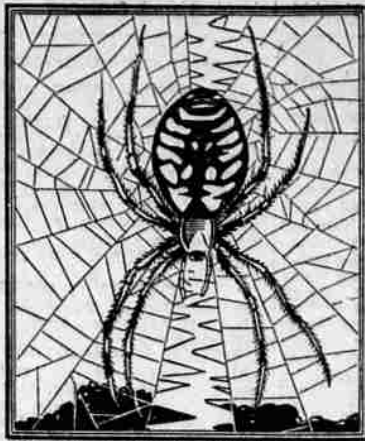
