

Ceiling Prices at Stores Here To Be Checked by OPA

In compliance with requests from the OPA in Washington, D. C., for a national survey of food store ceiling prices, the Roseburg War Price and Rationing board is rapidly completing plans for a complete check of all stores of this area from March 13 to 18 inclusive. Mr. Hobart Price, district OPA coordinator, visited the Roseburg office last Wednesday and gave preliminary instructions to all the OPA personnel and eight volunteer price assistants from the senior high school.

This national survey has been instituted for the purpose of securing a nation wide check of compliance on the part of merchants and giving assistance to those merchants who need such help to get in line with the regulations, states L. V. Hammock,

chairman of the War Price and Rationing board.

Mr. Hammock further states that it is expected that the merchants will extend the same full cooperation in this survey as they have in the past and that few violations are anticipated.

In order to accomplish this rapid check the OPA office will remain open on Tuesday and Thursday only to receive rationing applications. No ration or price information will be issued on those two days.

Harvest Needs Soldier Labor, Ellsworth Says

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10—(AP)—Representative Ellsworth (R-Ore.) has requested the War department to consider Oregon's agricultural situation before a decision is made to close down Camp Adair or Camp White.

There was no indication that such moves were being contemplated by the army but Ellsworth filed this request any way.

"Last season the fruit crop in Southern Oregon was harvested, and thus saved to a large extent, by soldiers on leave from Camp White . . . this harvesting was done by men on their own time without special leave for the purpose."

"Much valuable help was ren-

dered farmers in the Willamette valley area in the vicinity of Camp Adair on the same basis. Had it not been for such help, I am certain that the total food production in the Southern Oregon region would have been much less than it was."

Hotel Fire Blamed on Smoker's Carelessness

PORTLAND, Mar. 10—(AP)—A blaze which broke out on the Hotel Roosevelt's fourth floor early this morning charred two rooms and left two Camp Adair sergeants clad only in shorts.

The fire, attributed by Fire Investigator William Goetz to a smoker's carelessness, was checked after all furniture and luggage

in two hotel rooms was destroyed.

Sgt. Walter Hirsch and Sgt. Eduardo Garcia, who occupied the room where the blaze broke out, were taken to a servicemen's center for enough clothing to get them back to Camp Adair.

Death, Damage Dealt Edmonton By Windstorm

EDMONTON, Mar. 10—(CP)—One man was dead and three persons were injured slightly as a result of a two-hour windstorm, at times raging up to 78-miles-an-hour, which struck Edmonton at 6 o'clock last night and caused considerable damage throughout the city.

An American at the Edmonton municipal airport was killed as he attempted to climb into a heavy transport plane and apply the brakes it broke loose from its moorings. The man slipped and was crushed under one of the wheels.

Three persons received minor injuries when two streetcars collided head-on at the city's main intersection at the height of the storm. Dozens of street cars were tied up and normal service was not restored for several hours. Sidewalk signs and 16 electric

light and telephone poles were torn down and indirectly caused several other traffic accidents.
