Navy To Need Half Million More Men

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14.—(AP)—With nearly a dozen new ships joining the United States fleet every day, the navy will need 3,000,000 officers and men by the end of this year—or an increase of nearly 500,000 over its present manpower.

The figures were given by Secretary of the Navy Knox and Vice Admiral Randall Jacobs, chief of the bureau of navy personnel, at a conference today.

Jacobs emphasized that the dozen-ships-a-day figure is based wholly on sea-going vessels and does not include small auxiliaries, although the total covers "some of the larger landing craft."

The personnel chief estimated that the navy's total strength by the end of 1944 will be 3,000,000 officers and men, while the total for all naval services, including marines and coast guard, is expected to be approximately 3,700,000.

In disclosing the rate of ship additions, Knox said that the number of ships in the fleet has increased from 913 on January 1, 1942, to 4,167 on January 1, 1944.

Father, Son Face Indictments Here

Four indictments were returned by the Douglas county grand jury Monday, two of them setting charges of rape and contributing to the delinquency of a minor against Woodrow Stiltner, Roseburg, and two charging Woodrow Stiltner and his father, Ross Stiltner, jointly with contributing to the delinquency of a minor and enticing a child away from its parents.

The two men are accused, District Attorney J. V. Long reports, of assisting a minor girl to leave her home and go to Kansas, where she later was located by officers and returned to her home in Roseburg.

The defendants were arraigned in circuit court where they pleaded innocent to all counts. They were at liberty on bail.

MARCH 20—Expiration date of brown stamps Y and Z. Each weekly series good for 16 points. (8, 5, 2, 1-point values.)

RATION BOOK NO. 4

(Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.)

MARCH 20—Expiration date of green stamps K, L and M. (8, 5, 2, 1-point values.)

MAY 20—Expiration date of red stamps AB, BB, CB, DB, EB and FB in ration book No. 4 (meat, butter, fats, cheese, canned milk, canned fish, oils). Each stamp has a 10-point value. Series AB, BB and CB valid now. Series DB, EB and FB valid on March 12.

MAY 20—Expiration date of blue stamps AG, BG, CG, DG and EG in ration book No. 4 (processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies).
