Civilian Killed, Army Officer Hurt In Medford Battle

MEDFORD, Ore., Mar. 13—(AP)—A civilian father of two children was killed and an army lieutenant was wounded in a knife battle over the office's wife last night, District Attorney George Neilson said today.

Dallas Grove, 25, a Medford salesman who delivered to the army man's home, was stabbed through the heart with a butcher knife, Neilson said.

Lt. William Foster, 23, Camp White finance officer from Spokane, Wash., was wounded and taken to the camp hospital, where he was held on an open charge, for treatment, the district attorney said. He suffered severe head injuries.

Foster and his wife recently were involved in a divorce action, Neilson said, the final decree having been signed Saturday. The Fosters have a year-old daughter.

Neilson quoted Mrs. Foster as saying that Foster objected to Grove's coming to the Foster house and that he had announced he was "going to talk the matter over" with Grove.

Mrs. Foster said Grove "told us to settle our own problem and then we would decide what to do," the district attorney reported. The fight followed in the kitchen of the Foster home, he said.

Neilson said Foster would be held for the Jackson county grand jury. Foster entered the army as a private and was graduated from officer school at Fort Benning, Ga. Mrs. Foster was married March 21, 1941, Neilson said.
