New Passenger Autos by July, 1945, Scheduled

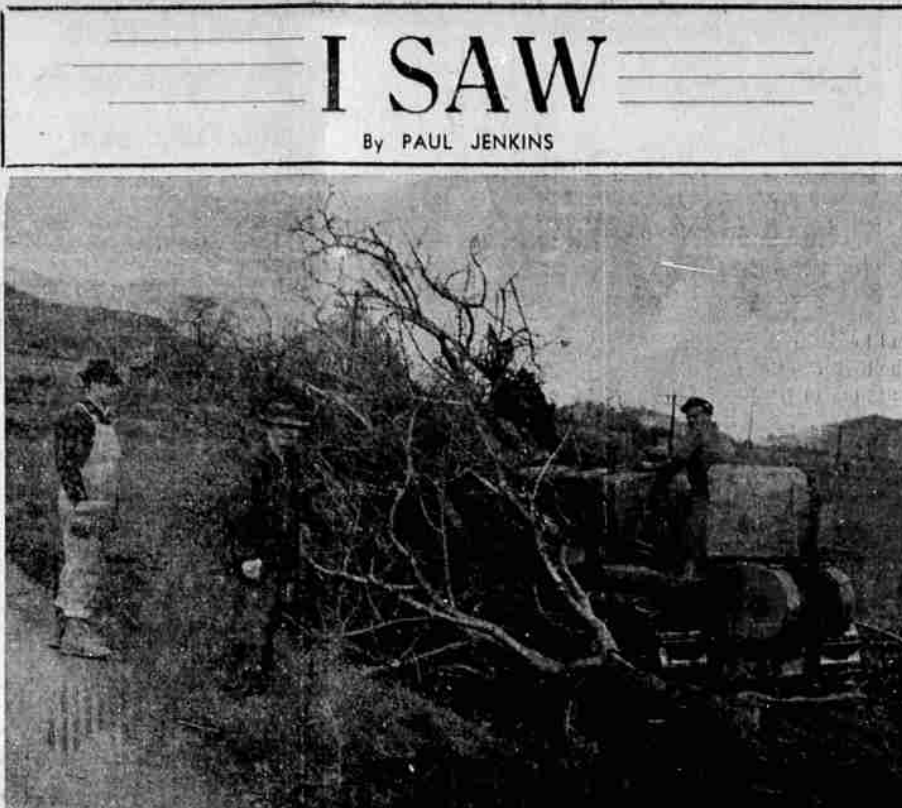
NEW YORK, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Limited production of passenger cars will begin by September with the first new models scheduled to be on the market by July, 1945, says Ray Chamberlain, executive vice president of the National Automobile Dealers association.

He said that the partial resumption of automobile production would be undertaken to meet transportation needs of civilians essential to the war effort.

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A CREW clearing ground for the erection of the Erickson Lumber & Shingle Company's sawmill at Riddle. The site is on an eight-acre tract half a mile west of town, purchased from Lewis Fullerton, adjoining the railway. The mill is planned for 40,000 feet capacity and its completion is scheduled for about the middle of June. It will employ about 18 men.

Wage Raise Given City Workers of Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Union leaders have announced acceptance of a \$10 monthly wage raise authorized yesterday for 3,400 employees of the city department of water and power, many of whom struck for nine days last month in a demand for a \$15 boost.

The \$10 increase was effected when the municipal board of water and power commissioners voted a \$5 monthly raise to be added to a similar hike approved in February for all workers paid \$350 a month or less.

The walkout was terminated when army authorities took control of the department under presidential order and operated it for a week.

Walkout Over Pay Halts 9 Portland Sawmills

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 15.—(AP)—Work halted at nine Portland sawmills today as approximately 1,600 CIO mill workers walked out to conduct a special

meeting protesting the wage scale. The West Coast Lumber commission, a War Labor board subsidiary, recently turned down a CIO request for an hourly increase from 90 cents to \$1.025. The commission is scheduled to review the case March 22. Joe Defreitas, local secretary of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, said the workers would return to their jobs after discussing a possible strike vote.

Republicans Of Senate Organize

WASHINGTON, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Republican members of the senate ratified unanimously today their present set of officers and organized a steering committee with Senator Taft of Ohio at the helm.

Senator White of Maine was retained as acting leader in place of the late Charles McNary of Oregon and Senator Vandenberg of Michigan officially was named acting conference chairman. Senator Wheeler of Nebraska continues as whip and Senator Burton of Ohio as conference secretary.

All officers were elected only for the rest of the present session of congress which ends next January.

Vandenberg said after the meeting: "Our action was based on the expectation that the republican party will obtain control not only of the government but also of the senate next November."

"We wish to be entirely free at that time to fit our permanent organization to the necessities of these events."

"We have every anticipation of aggressive harmony."

Ford Co., Picketed, Sends Appeal to Governor

DETROIT, Mar. 15.—(AP)—The Ford Motor company, reporting production of its Rouge plant curtailed approximately 75 per cent by an automobile picket line this morning and complaining that protection afforded by police of suburban Dearborn was inadequate, today requested assignment of state police to Dearborn.

A telegram to Governor Harry F. Kelly from Superintendent R. Rausch of Ford's Rouge plant also asked the governor "to initiate removal proceedings against such officials of the city of Dearborn who are responsible for this refusal to render proper police protection."

Rausch asked Kelly to assign sufficient state police "to give the company the police protection necessary to enable it to maintain an uninterrupted flow of war materials to our armed forces."
