Good Interview Indispensable to Job Placement

Good interviews are indispensable to good job placements, whether the applicant is an honorably discharged veteran, a handicapped person or any other citizen, conferees at the last session of a two-day conclave at the Roseburg office of the United States employment service were told today by H. M. Robbins, training officer from the state War Manpower commission headquarters in Portland.

"It is equally important," he stressed, "to secure and record the right kind of information about a job applicant. Otherwise, the prospective worker to an employer will not have enough information to determine whether the applicant qualifies for the position or not." Robbins discussed at length specialized interviewing techniques.

G. C. Weeks, WMC staff training supervisor, detailed occupational analysis and selective placement procedure for handicapped persons for the assembled USES area managers, while E. G. Sloan, special services supervisor, placement division, and J. Richard Smurthwaite, Jr., veterans' employment representative, described the cooperative arrangements established with federal and state agencies, management and labor, for helping solve the problems of honorably discharged servicemen and women.

Similar two-day conferences are scheduled for the Salem office of the United States employment service Friday and Saturday, and in other key centers of the state during the next two weeks, according to F. W. Chase, local USES manager.

RATION BOOK NO. 3

(Brown stamps) for purchase of meats-fats, etc.

MARCH 20—Expiration date of brown stamps Y and Z. Each weekly series good for 16 points. (8, 5, 2, 1-point values.)

RATION BOOK NO. 4

(Processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies.)

MARCH 20—Expiration date of green stamps K, L and M. (8, 5, 2, 1-point values.)

MAY 20—Expiration date of red stamps A8, B8, C8, D8, E8 and F8 in ration book No. 4 (meat, butter, fats, cheese, canned milk, canned fish, oils). Each stamp has a 10-point value. Series A8, B8 and C8 valid now. Series D8, E8 and F8 valid on March 12.

blue stamps A8, B8, C8, D8 and E8 in ration book No. 4 (processed fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies). All valid now. Each stamp has a 10-point value.

SUGAR
MARCH 31—Expiration date of stamp 30, in Book Four, good for 5 pounds.

SHOES
Stamp No. 10, book one, and "Airplane" stamp No. 1, book three, valid for one pair each for indefinite period.

STOVES
Purchasers must get certificates at ration boards for most new stoves.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
Fuel dealers deliver by priorities based on needs.

FUEL OIL
MARCH 31—Expiration date of period 3 coupons.

GASOLINE
MARCH 21—Expiration date of No. 10 stamps.

Value of gasoline coupons—A, B1, C1, 3 gals.; B2, C2, R and T, 5 gals.; D, 1.5 gals.; E, 1 gal.

Coupons must be endorsed as soon as received—your protection against the black market.

Cars with C ration books must have tires inspected every 3
