Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit in the form of a certified check in favor of the treasurer of the United States. The deposit of any successful bidder will be credited on the contract. Payment in full at the time of filing the contract is required in sales amounting to \$2500 or less. Patricia Travers Delights Audience With Fine Concert

Patricia Travers, young American violinist, who was presented in concert by the Community Concert association last evening at the junior high school, is a shining example of what is possible for the younger generation to attain at so young an age as eighteen. She was born in the United States and her teachers have been American. She is as near an all-American artist as any in this country today and at so young an age, she is considered one of the most outstanding violinists of this generation.

Miss Travers was accompanied to Roseburg by her parents and the pianist, Hendrik Endt. She is not only a great artist, but she has charm, grace and an exceptionally fine personality on the concert stage and in everyday living. She has been credited with being a fine actress as was displayed by her acting in a recent motion picture in Hollywood and she is also an exceptionally fine pianist.

The priceless instrument Miss Travers uses is an outstanding historic example of a Joseph Guarnerius del Jesu dated 1733. This same great master made the violin, which was used by the immortal Paganini.

Miss Travers opened her concert by playing the Star Spangled Banner, followed by Fugue in A major, Melodie from the opera "Orpheus" and Allegro. The second part of the program was the beautiful Concerto No. 4 in D minor, which was so greatly enjoyed, that the artist responded with an encore.

Following intermission, Mr. Endt, pianist, very ably and beautifully played two piano solos, "Two Arabesques" by Debussy and "Tartarian Folksongs and Dances" and so pleased the audience that they demanded two encores. Mr. Endt is a world-famous accompanist, having accompanied some of the finest artists of the generation and making a number of recordings. He was born in Holland and has traveled all over the world as an accomplished pianist.

Miss Travers followed the piano solos by playing Introduction and Tarantelle, Capricieuse, Moto Perpetuo, Ave Maria, Tambourin cinois and closed her program with Tzigane by Maurice Ravel. A number of encores were graciously played by Miss Travers, who received curtain call after curtain call by the audience.

Probably one of the most outstanding numbers enjoyed by the audience was Moto perpetuo by Nikolai Paganini, who was the greatest violinist of all time and who used to dazzle his audiences with feats of wizardry. "Moto perpetuo" is a tour de force in that it is an endurance test of persistent spicatto combined with cleverly designed melodic sequences. Avia Maria by Franz Schubert was a favorite with the group, being so much better known to the audience. All in all, the membership of the association expressed great satisfaction in the concert of Miss Travers, who was so very ably assisted by Mr. Endt, and feel that here is one of the finest artists of the day.

Miss Travers graciously received members of the audience after the concert and signed autographs. Mrs. Frank Tripp, Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Worley and the host and hostess, Mr. and Mrs. Waltemire. Five tables of pinochle were at play during the evening with Mrs. Worley and Carroll Dill, Sr., winning the high score prizes, and Mr. and Mrs. Wenderoth low score prizes. At a late hour dainty refreshments were served.
