OSC Scholarship Given in Memory Of Lt. W. C. Leedy

Announcement was made at Corvallis today of establishment of a \$2,000 scholarship at Oregon State college in memory of Lieutenant William C. (Clark) Leedy, U. S. navy, killed in an Aleutians air crash last summer. The fund was contributed by Mr. and Mrs. Jay C. Leedy, Brooks, Oregon, parents of the flier. The scholarship will encourage scientific research to prevent crashes such as caused Lieutenant Leedy's death.

Mr. and Mrs. Leedy and their family resided in Roseburg for a number of years while Mr. Leedy served as county agricultural agent.

Lieutenant Leedy's widow, the former Meredith Jenkins, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Jenkins, Roseburg, resides in Seattle. One of Leedy's brothers, James Leedy, is a senior in aeronautical engineering at Oregon State college.

Alkalis Monopoly Cartel Charged
WASHINGTON, Mar. 16.—(AP)—Two American export associations, 13 American manufacturers, and a British corporation and its agent were accused today by the justice department of maintaining international cartel agreements to restrain trade in the manufacture and marketing of Alkalis, in violation of the Sherman anti-trust act.

Attorney General Biddle said a civil suit filed in the U. S. district court in New York alleged the defendants have conspired to allocate and maintain exclusive marketing areas and export quotas throughout the world, eliminate competition and restrain exports by means of illegal contracts, agreements and understandings.

In addition to the defendants, the suit named four corporations—two American, one German and one Belgian—as co-conspirators.

The trade associations are United States Alkali Export association, Inc., (Alkasso), with principal offices in New York, and California Alkali Export association (Calkeex), with principal offices in Los Angeles.

Second of Triplets Born To Soldier's Wife Dies
PORTLAND, March 16.—(AP)—Only one of the triplets born Monday to Mrs. Tyrus Cobb, wife of a sergeant now serving in England, remained alive today.

The second triplet, a boy, died last night. Hospital attendants said the survivor, Sherryann, was "doing as well as could be expected."

Each of the infants, born two months prematurely, weighed about three pounds. One died shortly after birth.

Profiteering in "Labor Hiring" is Exposed at Probe

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16.—(AP)—Profits running as high as 250 per cent on the services of workmen hired out to war contractors by professional "labor-hirers" have been disclosed in reports of investigators of the house military committee, H. Ralph Burton, committee counsel, said today.

Burton estimated in an interview that at least 25 cases of what he called "labor renting traffic" are being investigated throughout the country, with profits running into millions of dollars which are charged against the government through cost-plus-a-fixed-fee contracts.

Because the investigations have not been completed, he declined to name the companies engaging in the practice, but said one of them, operating plants in Chicago and New York, had realized in 1943 a profit of \$4,240,988 on the wages of men it sent out to war industries.

Wages paid by the company to its Chicago men, Burton said, were \$1,015,558, but the war plants engaging the workmen were billed for \$3,562,191. The same company billed New York plants for \$2,511,874 and paid only \$817,517 of that amount to the men it sent out.

Other companies, he added, have billed employers for as much as \$48 for the services of a skilled man for Sunday work, although the worker received only a small part of it.

Francois A. Dustheimer, Local Decorator, Dies

Mr. Dustheimer was engaged in work as an interior decorator. Recitation of the Rosary will be observed at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 7:15 o'clock tonight. Funeral services will be conducted by the Rev. William Coughlan at St. Joseph's Catholic church at 9 a. m. Saturday, with interment following in the Catholic cemetery.
