To Be Heard Here March 23rd



Todd Duncan

The story of Todd Duncan, the famous Negro baritone who appears here in recital on Thursday evening, March 23, at 8:15 o'clock at Junior high school in a program featuring songs of "Porgy and Bess", the folk-opera in which he has starred for the past two years, is no "simple annals of the poor". He hasn't a long story of trials and tribulations and his mother never had to scrub over a washboard to send him to school. The wolf was never at the Duncan door. Todd's father was a garage owner and his mother was a music teacher so that the boy's instinct for a song came rather naturally.

Robert Todd Duncan was born almost forty years ago into this mildly prosperous environment. He was a product of the Bluegrass of Kentucky, but he didn't remain very long in the South. When he was only four he was taken by his family to Indianapolis where he grew up. He is proud of the fact that he was born on Lincoln's birthday and bears the names of Lincoln's two sons, as well as that of their mother's Lexington family.

As a small child Todd was soon thumping out reasonably accurate renditions of the pieces he had heard his mother teach her pupils. When he was five his mother began to give him regular lessons.

In high school, he was an industrious but hardly spectacular student but by the time he enrolled as an undergraduate at Butler university he was beginning to suspect his talents as a musician. He began training in voice and piano lessons. Simultaneously he was completing his academic courses at the university and had begun studying voice and theory at the College of Music and Fine Arts in Indianapolis. When he was graduated at 21 in midyear he at once began teaching in a local junior high school and the following autumn returned to Louisville as an instructor in English and music at the City College.

It was there that he made his first acquaintance with the stage, although in a distinctly amateur way. During his four years in Louisville he directed innumerable operettas, including much Gilbert and Sullivan as well as such pieces as "The Marriage of Figaro" and "The Chocolate Soldier".

But a thirst for knowledge brought him to New York to study for master's degree at Columbia while taking further voice

Caution Enjoined In Preparation of Pork or Products

Persons who prepare pork or pork products for human consumption should take every precaution to cook it properly so there will be no danger of trichinosis, warn officials of the state department of agriculture. Within recent months several Oregon residents have been victims of trichinosis and the warning is heightened by the death in recent weeks of three persons.

Too great emphasis cannot be placed upon the proper home curing of pork. Farmers and those feeding one or two hogs do not always cook the garbage for hogs, as is required in this state of commercial swine feeders. Eating uncooked offal, hogs often get into their system the trichina infection or worm. While hogs apparently have become immune to this, the immunity is not passed to humans who partake of unsterilized pork containing the worm.

A microscopic worm so destructive that it can cause undecipherable pain causes this disease, which may either kill or cause the partaker of improperly prepared pork to enter a stage of chronic invalidism, says Dr. W. H. Lytle, chief of the department's division of animal industry. The human body receives the disease trichinosis from infested pork that has not been thoroughly sterilized. There is no known immediate cure for the severe muscle ailment which is a certain aftermath for those persons who survive trichinosis.

Symptoms of this disease are easily mistaken for intestinal influenza, colitis, appendicitis or food poisoning or the first stages of typhoid fever. Later there follows rheumatism, laryngitis, pneumonia, pleurisy, myocarditis, encephalitis or other troubles, depending upon into which organ the parasitic worm burrows. Rules suggested to ward off trichinosis infection follow:

Cook all pork to the "well done" stage; that is, until it has lost its pinkish color.

Heat large thick cuts of pork at least 30 minutes to the pound.

For sausage manufacture, use a meat thermometer inserted in the middle of the portion.
