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Continued Vigil on Home Front, Urge Of Legion Speaker

A plea for continued vigilance and cooperation at home in the war effort until victory has been won was made Saturday night by Victor J. Micelli, vice-commander of the Oregon department, American Legion, speaking at the 25th birthday party of Umpqua post and auxiliary.

Pointing out that while military successes appear to have removed the danger of enemy attack, it would be foolish to assume that suicide raids for the sake of raising morale of the people of enemy countries are impossible. It is essential, the speaker declared, that civilian defense programs be maintained, that Americans be vigilant in preventing sabotage and that all-out production for war be continued until victory is achieved. A spirit of over optimism could still be fatal to the war effort, he declared.

The Roseburg post's 25th anniversary was celebrated with a party at the Knights of Pythias lodge hall, where the program was presented by a committee consisting of George Trapalis, Rudolph Ritzman and Clinton Gorthy. Leroy Garwood Funeral Services Held in Roseburg

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Douglas Funeral home for Leroy Garwood who died in Roseburg Wednesday, March 15, after more than a year of falling ill.

Born in Nevada City, Calif., February 7, 1889, of California pioneer parentage, he was the elder son of Lewis C. and Mattie Erskine Garwood. He received his education in California and came to Oregon at the age of twenty-four, accepting employment with the United States forest service. He was serving as telephone engineer for Mt. Hood National forest at the time of World War I, when he was commissioned as first lieutenant in the signal corps, where he served nineteen months as commanding officer with the Spruce Production division for aeronautical materials in Northern Washington.

At the close of the war, he returned to forestry work as district ranger on the Siuslaw National forest and was stationed at Hebo, Oregon, for seventeen years. In 1935, he was made chief of fire control of the Siuslaw forest where he served for the following three years. He came to Roseburg in 1940 as district ranger of the Diamond Lake district on the Umpqua National forest.

Due to failing health, he retired from active duty last September.

Surviving are his wife, Helen May, whom he married in Portland, Oregon, November 2, 1915; a son, Lee E. Jr., petty officer 2nd class on duty in the Southwest Pacific; a daughter, Barbara J., draftsman at Boeing Aircraft Co., Seattle, now at home; and a brother, L. C. Garwood, of Nevada City, Calif.
