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Senator Assailed For Leaving Feast As Critic Talks

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—(AP)—

Senator Davis (R-Pa.) said Saturday that a published report that he left a Philadelphia St. Patrick's day dinner last night in protest against a speech by Chief Justice George W. Maxey of the Pennsylvania supreme court was "infamous."

Davis, who had been a speaker at the annual dinner of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick, declared that he left the dinner before Justice Maxey began to speak in order to keep two other speaking engagements himself.

Justice Maxey, a republican, was quoted as telling dinner guests that republican party leadership in Pennsylvania "has too often refused to place in conspicuous positions of governor or U. S. senator Pennsylvania's ablest men."

"I had these other engagements when I went to the dinner," Davis said today, "and I didn't even hear Justice Maxey's talk. There's nothing to the whole story."

The Philadelphia Record today said "While Maxey was in the middle of that sentence (quoted above), Davis, who was occupying the chair next to the left at which the jurist was speaking, got up and left the room. All eyes watched Davis' departure and there were audible whispers from all parts of the ballroom."
