TOMMY CHENOWETH CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

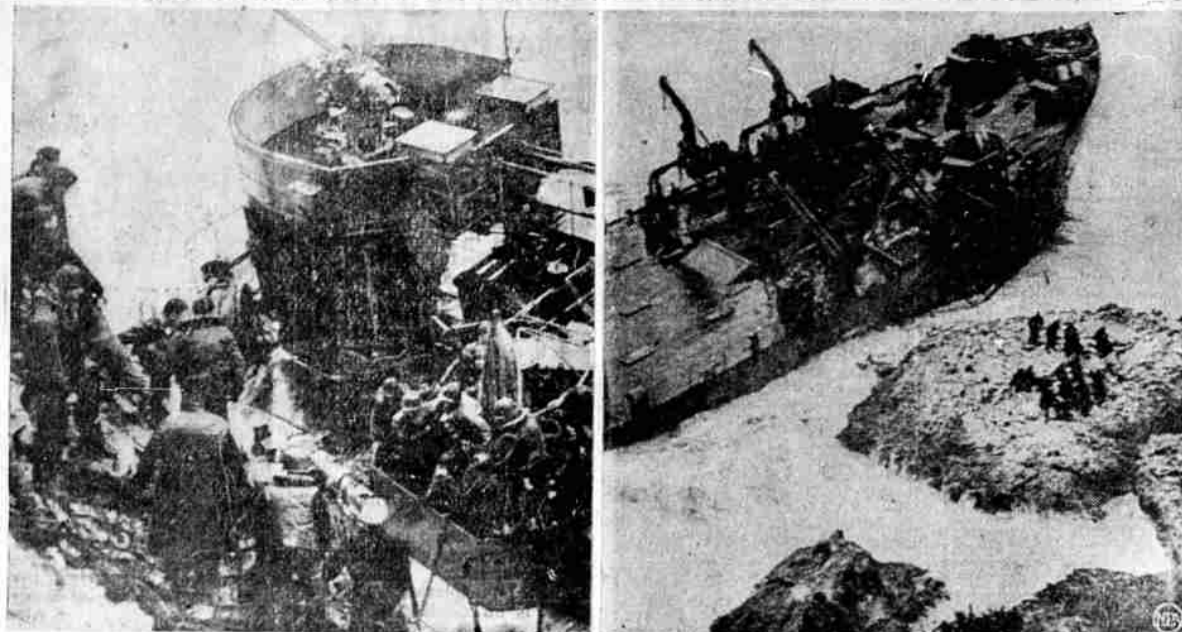
