Nazi Clamp Extended To Bulgaria, Rumania

stretching 500 miles into southern Russia.

Proskurov is 60 miles east of Tarnopol.

The broadcast said the flanking assault here was in support of "enemy formations advancing in the direction of the Dniester." The Germans have not acknowledged the Russian crossing of the Dniester and plunge into Bessarabia, which Moscow declared had knifed to within 30 miles of the Prut river border of Rumania.

Other soviet forces striking southward were reported within 48 miles of the major escape road for the thousands of Germans in the Odessa bottleneck.

Big Gain Made in Poland

The hammer and sickle was raised above 330 more liberated towns and villages yesterday as the Russians continued to pound the Germans back along the 500-mile front from Old Poland to the Black sea. The soviet bulletin said the forces striking for Lwow, big nazi communications hub in Old Poland, had crashed into Lwow province. The Russians were within 56 miles of Lwow itself.

A battle of "unparalleled ferocity" was declared by the Germans to be raging around Kovel, an important rail junction 100 miles north of Lwow on the road to Warsaw, but the report was without soviet confirmation. Kovel is 500 miles from Berlin, the same distance as the allied invasion forces massed in Britain.

Water Preference Bill Voted Down in House

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22—(AP)—The house today tentatively rejected on a teller vote of 77 to 48 an amendment to the omnibus rivers and harbors bill which would have given irrigation, domestic, mining and industrial uses preference over navigation in use of water in western states.

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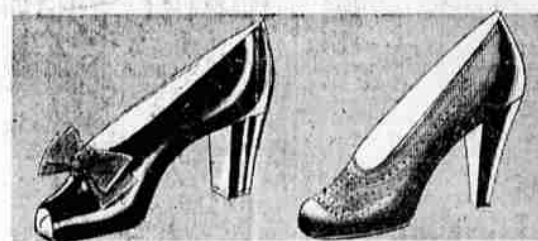

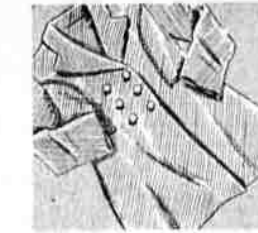
