

Hull Outlines Program For World Peace

17-Point Statement On Foreign Policy of U. S. Raises Vital Questions

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22—(AP)—A 17-point foreign policy statement by Secretary of State Hull today gave the United States a bid for postwar political leadership, and at the same time brought into sharper relief a half dozen questions of immediate diplomatic concern.

Hull's statement was viewed here as setting goals for long range international cooperation and security on a basis of sovereign equality of all countries, large or small, beyond the limits to which other world leaders have committed themselves.

The immediate questions for which his program furnishes a background are outside the scope of his statement, which is based on Hull's speeches over the past two years. But they may be decided in the light of the principles he laid down. They are:

1. What kind of relationship, military or diplomatic, is this government ready to extend to the French National committee or possibly other patriotic groups, in preparation for the liberation of France by allied invasion armies?

2. Should the United States now break relations with Finland over Helsinki's rejection of Russia's peace terms, which official Washington considered lenient in view of Finland's inevitable defeat?

3. If Russia, whose armies are penetrating steadily deeper into Poland, decides finally against dealing with the Polish government in London, will the United States (and Britain as well) recognize a new Polish government?

4. What measures is the United States prepared to support for beginning the political reconstruction of Italy after allied armies reach Rome, at which point the Badoglio government is supposed to relinquish control?

5. How long can the United States maintain its present policy of withholding recognition from Argentina without actively implementing its dislike of the present regime through economic measures?

6. Will the United States in collaboration with Britain further tighten restrictions on pro-axis Spain and pro-allied Turkey if those neutrals do not sever trade relations with Germany, and on neutral Ireland if it persists in harboring axis officials?

Should Fight For Liberty

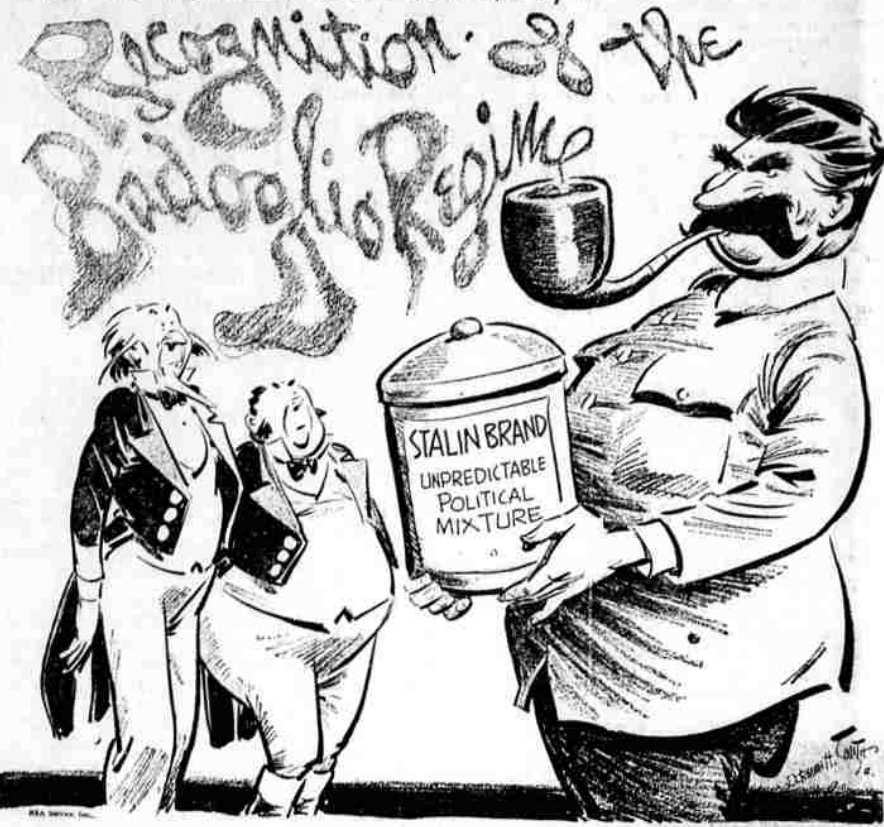
Other points known to be applicable to current situations, such as the French recognition problem, include a statement that each nation "should be free to decide for itself the forms and detail of its governmental organization," a basic belief which prevents this government from committing itself to the support of any political force in occupied European countries before the peoples of those countries have a chance to express their will.

Another point which had the ring of a summons to people under the axis yoke to rally now to the united nations cause, was Hull's assertion that "there is no surer way for men and for nations to show themselves worthy of liberty than to fight for its preservation."

On the long range questions of international organization, the secretary called for creation of an international agency backed by adequate force to maintain peace, the settlement of dangerous political differences by negotiation, the organization of an international court to solve legal disputes, and the reduction of armaments so far as they may be reduced without endangering the force necessary to maintain peace.

Along with a reaffirmation of faith in the Atlantic charter, the secretary placed full reliance in the declaration signed by the soviet union, Great Britain, the United States and China at Moscow last fall as an instrument of laying the foundation for successful cooperation once the war is won.

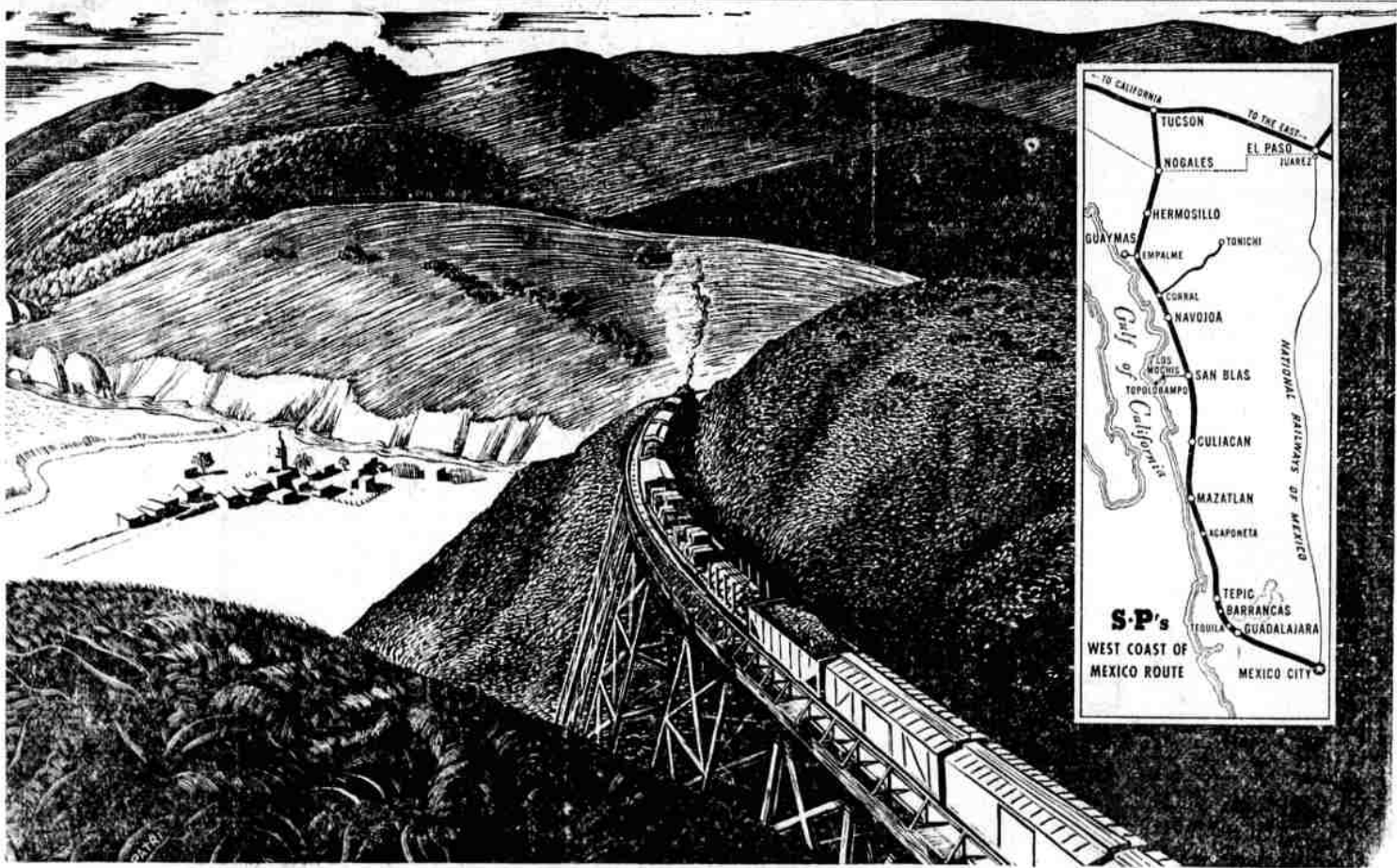
