Churchill Dated For Broadcast to Clarify War Aims

LONDON, Mar. 23.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill will address the nation Sunday amid a rising clamor on both sides of the Atlantic for clarification of the allied war aims.

The speech, scheduled for 9 p. m. (1 p. m. PWT), is awaited here as a possible key to the position which Britain may take on the multiple problems expected to come up for discussion at the forthcoming conferences in London between U. S. Under-Secretary of State Edward R. Stettin, Jr., and the British foreign office.

Growing demands in the house of commons and the United States for a detailed statement on allied war and postwar plans, as well as for clarification of what revisions—if any—can be expected in the Atlantic charter, have suggested the additional possibility that Churchill and Roosevelt may seek another meeting with Premier Stalin.

The lone political hand which Russia has been playing lately in connection with Italian, French, Yugoslav and Polish affairs has raised many questions in both Britain and America concerning the solidarity of the "big three" powers.

It has been an open secret in London for some time that the European advisory commission set up after the Moscow conference of foreign ministers is not

getting the desired results in settling postwar problems and that some new form of collaboration is desirable.

American engineers restored gas service to war-stricken Naples in six weeks. Italian engineers estimated it would take six months.

New Fibre Flax Plant Destroyed by Fire

EVERETT, Wash., Mar. 23.—(AP)—Shoshomish county's newest industry, the Pacific Fibre Flax company at Monroe was destroyed by fire of undetermined origin early this morning with a loss estimated by President Frank Jackson at \$100,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 24.—The American Red Cross today announced receipt, through its chapters, of two war fund contributions from American prisoners of war—one held by the Japanese and one by the Germans.

Lt. Col. James P. S. Devereux, Marine Corps hero of Bataan and Corregidor, now held by the enemy in Shanghai Prison Camp, wrote his son, Pat, as follows: "Tell your grandmother to take \$100 and get a life membership in my name, in the American Red Cross."

Pat, who lives with his grandmother, Mrs. John T. Welch, 1124 El Camino, Burlingame, California, since the death of his mother in Washington after Col. Devereux's imprisonment, bought a \$50 membership in his father's name, and contributed \$30 to the San Mateo Red Cross Chapter.

Captain Irving J. Yarock of Worcester, Mass., a prisoner in Germany, wrote his father "The Red Cross took care of us with clothes and necessities. We have regularly received Red Cross Prisoners of War Food Packages, which the Red Cross may be interested in knowing. I have received 14 parcels so far. Dad, will you write a check with my name and send it to the Red Cross, about a hundred dollars, I guess."

Red Cross officials here pointed out that the food parcels and military clothing sent to military prisoners are paid for by the U. S. Army and Navy, but many other supplies, including medicines, comfort articles, etc., are gifts from the Red Cross. All supplies are sent by and through the Red Cross.

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"I wonder if Bill thinks he has been paying his taxes the 'easy way'?"
"Bill is too smart to be taken in by the tax arguments of the saloon crowd, he just drinks because he wants to, or maybe he can't help himself."
"I saw in the paper that Uncle Sam spent only fifty seven cents to collect each hundred dollars of internal revenue last year."
"Yes, and for every dollar the saloon turns in in taxes it collects three dollars from the public. That's what I call paying taxes the expensive way."

"Could the Federal Government get along without the tax money collected from the public by the saloons?"
"Of course it could. Last year less than ten percent of the total Federal revenue came from liquor taxes."
"A lot of people know that the whole liquor tax argument is simply a smoke screen. The saloon crowd wants to keep legal the business of starting non-drinkers to drink, of getting moderate drinkers, like Bill, to drink more, and to satisfy the drunkard."
"That's about right. Let's give Bill a hand home before he gets into trouble."
