Famous Baritone Delights Members of Concert Association

Todd Duncan, world-famous baritone, was enthusiastically received by the members of the Community Concert association, when he presented a recital last evening at the junior high school auditorium with Miss June McMechen, assisting soprano, and William Allen, pianist.

Todd Duncan is one of the most popular entertainers of the world today and from the minute he stepped before his audience last evening, he kept them highly entertained. He not only is a great singer and entertainer, but he has the faculty of appearing to love his work and to please his audience at all times.

The program opened by Mr. Duncan singing, "Thanks Be to Thee" and "Love That's True Will Live Forever." Part two included: Verrath; Der Gansum Liechen; Ich Trage Meine Minne; and Heimliche Aufforderung. Part three included: O Thou Billowy Harvest Field; Evening Prayer; The Waters of Tralee and Dancers, Come Up!

Following intermission, Mr. Duncan sang, Aria: Avant De quitter ces Lieux, from "Faust"; Brilage, and Danse Macabre.

The last part of the program included Negro spirituals, "Walk With Me" and "Every Time I Feel the Spirit," after which Mr. Duncan, assisted by Miss McMechen sang selections from "Porgy and Bess." Miss McMechen sang "Summertime," followed by a duet of "Bess, You is My Woman Now" and Mr. Duncan closing the program by singing, "I Got Plenty of Nuffin'."

charmed by Miss McMechen's singing and she was called back for an encore, while considerable applause went to the pianist, William Allen, who so very ably and delightfully played the accompaniments of the two artists.

Probably there is no artist in the entertainment world today, who has a finer stage personality as well as being a great singer than Todd Duncan. From the time he sings his first number, his audience is spellbound and the stillness of the auditorium shows the great respect and honor paid to his artistry by the listeners.

Duncan was born in Kentucky and is on the faculty of Howard University in Washington, D. C., where he is professor of music. He is married to the former Gladys Jackson of Charlottesville, Va., and he has one son, Charles, who is now a sophomore at Dartmouth college.

Miss McMechen was born in Hannibal, Mo., where her father was a physician. She studied at Howard university and while there won a contest conducted by

Fred Allen, of radio fame. She has appeared on a number of radio programs in Washington and Baltimore.

Mr. Allen, the pianist, is of particular interest to Oregon audiences, as he is a native of Portland and formerly attended Jefferson high school there. He later was graduated from Oberlin college conservatory of music in Ohio. He is an exceptionally fine pianist and all accompaniments were beautifully presented.

Following the concert Mr. Duncan signed autographs for members of the audience.

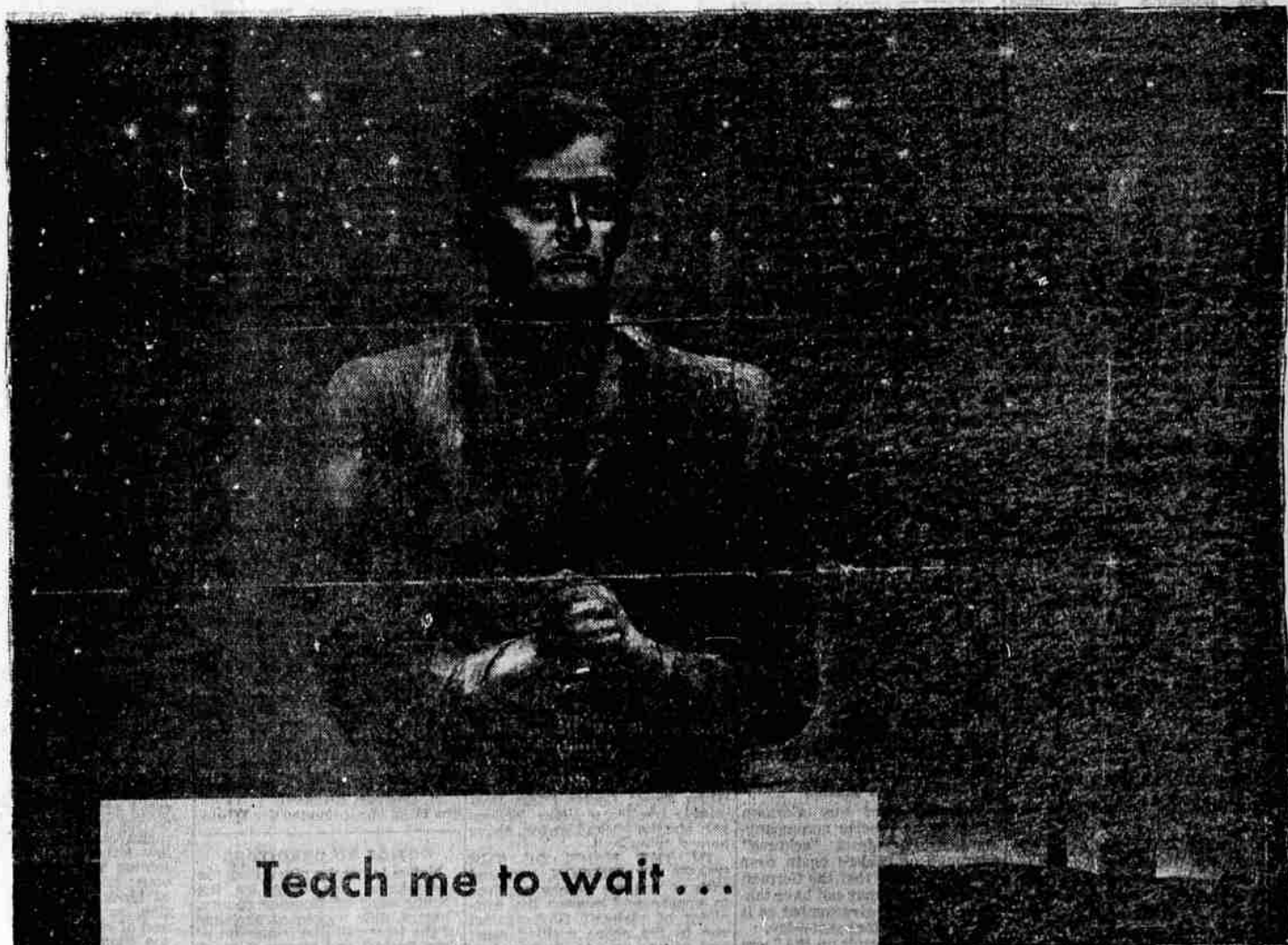
