"We must learn to say: 'This is my war. We must learn to substitute 'I' for 'we' in our thinking," said Vice Commander Victor Micelli at the twenty-sixth annual birthday party of the American Legion last Saturday night.

"The American Legion has always warned of wars," said Commander Micelli, "but now the American public is not calling us war mongers, they are listening to the voice of a group which has been consistent and right through out the years."

Commander Micelli was speaking to a large group of Legion and auxiliary members and their friends who had gathered at the K. P. hall to commemorate the founding of the Legion twenty-six years ago. The Legion has recently conducted a survey on a big scale and has, on the basis of this adopted a slogan "America alert." "We must not be caught unprepared," Mr. Micelli said. "There has been a slowing up in civilian defense. We have become over-optimistic, and this can only be corrected by ourselves," he said. "If we find fault, it too can be corrected by us. When there is a call for volunteers, there will be volunteers only if we answer. If each does away with gas cheating there will be no more gas cheating," he said. "We ask the man on the battle line to keep fighting to the last minute. We must do the same."

Commander Erwin Short of the local post was in charge of the evening's program. Following the program and initiation of three young men from this war, the group was served refreshments by a joint committee. Mrs. L. A. Rhoden, unit president, presented Commander Short with the birthday cake.

The National Legionnaire for March has announced that 79 senators have sponsored the Legion omnibus "bill of rights." This is a bill proposed to "aid the disabled and to help the demobilized to fit themselves back into the daily life of their communities. Senators from Oregon who sponsored the bill were Rufus C. 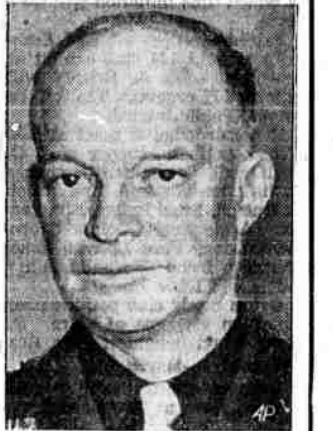

General Dwight D. Eisenhower commended the work of the American Red Cross in his broadcast of February 29th, as follows:



"If all American citizens could see for themselves the great good that their Red Cross contributions do for our fighting forces there would never be any slightest question as to the sufficiency of Red Cross funds."

"The Red Cross has been working in my command for many months. I have seen it in cities, in bivouacs and at the front. In fact, it is everywhere where Americans are fighting or training to fight for the preservation of democratic ideals.
