toric military barrier that has seldom been crossed. It seems a fair guess that the Russians propose to use them as a WALL to cut the German eastern line in half, preventing the nazis from shifting their forces back and forth to meet future Russian threats as they develop either in the north or in the south.

It is possible also to guess from the developments of the past week or so that Hitler has been FORCED to play the Russian game of division of the eastern front. He appears to be taking over, as swiftly and as decisively as he can, the Balkan states of Hungary, Rumania and Bulgaria, thus seemingly accepting the Russian plan of more or less SEPARATE wars in the south and the north.

A word of personal explanation may be in order here. This writer is not a strategist—not even an arm-chair strategist. To be a strategist of ANY kind, one must have access to complete information. Including, necessarily, accurate INSIDE information not published for the enemy's benefit.

TURNING from the fighting fronts to the home front, there's an interesting and perhaps immensely significant dispatch from Washington. It relates that republican FIRST TERM MEMBERS of the house of representatives have America's war and peace aims. The dispatch says: called on Secretary of State Hull for a PERSONAL summary of "The 24 'freshman' members, supporters of international machinery for a just and lasting peace" (therefore NOT isolationists) asked Hull generally: "Are the American objectives in this war determined and if not WHY not? If they HAVE been determined, MAKE THEM PUBLIC!"

INCLUDED among these 24 "freshmen" members of the house is Representative Harris Ellsworth, of the fourth Oregon district. THESE new members of congress are going back sensibly. It seems to this writer to President Wilson's GREAT mistakes in the last war. WILSON knew what he had in mind for the peace, but KEPT IT SECRET. So, at Versailles, he sprung a plan for which the American public had not been prepared by advance information and debate. What happened is TRAGIC.

WE OFFER A NICKEL

THE Oregon State Highway commission, the Douglas county court and the Roseburg city council should get together immediately, in our opinion, and do something about the North Roseburg traffic bottleneck. It is impossible for any one of the three groups to accomplish the right kind of results without knowing the plans of the other—and "time's awastin'."

Second Avenue South, the main road leading east from Roseburg is a part of the North Umpqua road. Eventually it will be incorporated in either a primary or secondary state highway. The state has surveyed the route and has projected plans for relocation and widening.

The street, at present, is carrying a heavy load of logging traffic, which, within the next few months will increase very rapidly.

There is no direct connection with the highway, forcing the funneling of logging trucks through the main business district of town, resulting in serious traffic congestion. This situation cannot long be tolerated in view of the rapid increase in population and number of motor vehicles using the main thoroughfares.

East Second Avenue South has suddenly developed potential business importance. It probably will receive the nickname "Machinery Row" in the very near future. There are prospects that this street will be the center for agencies handling heavy logging equipment, together with machine shops, service institutions and like types of business connected with the machinery trade. Already one large agency has purchased property and is planning construction. The Salem Sand and Gravel company is erecting a building. The Redy-Mix Concrete company has established its headquarters. A large machine shop is contemplated. Within a few more months the street doubtless will be occupied almost entirely for business purposes, crowding out the existing residential property.

If the state highway department at some future date desires to widen and relocate the street to conform to the standards of the North Umpqua highway, it will be necessary to buy expensive right of way and force removal or alteration of concrete buildings. This will entail a great expense to taxpayers.

On the other hand, if the highway commission, which probably is ignorant of the speed with which Roseburg's industrial expansion is progressing, would view the project, we believe it would agree that prompt action in outlining the future road development would be advisable.

If the commission would give the county court and the city a plan for the improvements contemplated at some future date, it would be possible, we believe, for the city and county to impose zoning regulations, setting forth restrictions for the location of buildings upon the respective sites, leaving room for widening operations later. Unless some action is taken without delay, business structures will be erected adjacent to present property lines and there will be no opportunity for much needed street widening except at very great expense.

We believe a conference between the highway commission, county court and city council should be arranged just as quickly as possible to make a thorough study of the project. Some plan to connect with the Pacific highway should be adopted and executed without further procrastination. This connection should be made to fit into the state highway department's eventual program for the North Umpqua highway.

Just who should take the initiative in calling the suggested meeting is strictly a matter of opinion. We would suggest, just to get the movement started, that Mayor Bill Harris and County Judge Dave Busenbark flip a nickel to decide who shall send out the invitations.

We'll furnish the nickel.
