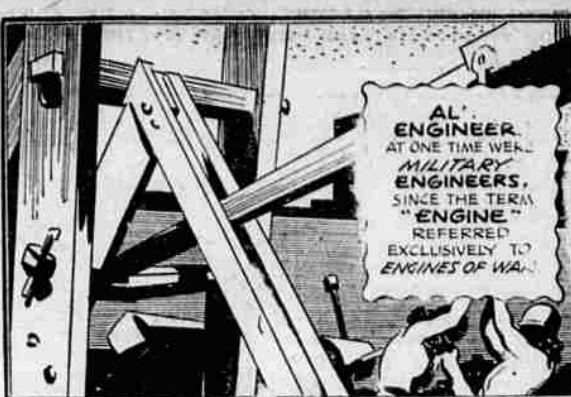

EGGS FROM GRASS

You heard the one about not worrying over butter shortage? You can get butter from grass — if you have a cow and a churn. Well you can really get lots of eggs from grass too, provided, of course, you have lots of hens.

Maybe you wonder why a feed manufacturer keeps telling you to raise more of your own feed. Well, we know you have to make a profit to stay in the business too. If you quit business, we lose a customer. We also know the margin of profit on eggs is not very high these days, what with high priced feeds and eggs going down.

A recent experiment shows that pullets ranging on good grass range, either all day, or afternoons only, laid from 25 to 35% more eggs than pullets under comparable conditions confined to bare lots. Hatchability was 50% better on the range, and best of all, it required 2 pounds less feed to produce a dozen eggs. (This experiment was made at the Tennessee Experiment station where climatic conditions are similar to ours.)

We have often been asked this question: "Does it hurt for hens to run out of doors, or should they be confined?" For the past several years we have been convinced that birds ranging produced more eggs and had lower mortality. We have seen many Douglas County flocks which convince us. But this experiment in Tennessee makes us feel completely safe in recommending the fullest possible use of "ranging" green feeds.

TURKEY FAT

Turkey hatching egg producers may wish to try to fatten the hens before marketing them. It has been proved poor economy to try this, since laying turkeys do not put on fat readily. We advise against

trying to fatten them. Just sell them as soon as market for eggs is satisfied. But if you want to try to fatten them, let us know how much TURKEY FAT you will want, as we are not making any at this time.

CORN SCARCE AGAIN

Clay Smith told us yesterday that as soon as he had his turkeys fat and on the market, corn became plentiful. It sure looked that way, and for a couple months corn was easy to get, though high in price, like all other feeds.

The corn was high in moisture, but in spite of this, feed men stored as much as possible. It is well they did, since all of a sudden corn supplies fell over night. Even the plants making corn products such as starch, corn, and corn breakfast "corn flakes" are threatened with closing shop because of the corn famine.

One market expert sums it up like this: "Government will probably commandeer 25% of all corn available for these products. The Pacific Coast can figure on nothing, as Midwest feeders will gobble up the balance. O.P.A. regulations work against the Coast, and we can hold out little hope for chances in time to be of benefit. When regulations work against us, the middle west needs the corn, how can we expect to get anything out here?"

SHORTAGES

Perhaps you think these shortages of various things are artificial, and maybe they are. But we have an inquiry from a great industrial outfit in Chicago, offering to pay for "any size carton, large or small, new or used, that you have available." So, let's save!

NO BUM MASH NOW

For nearly a year now we have heard "the old, old story": Our chicks didn't do well; our hens didn't lay well; our turkeys didn't grow well; our cows didn't milk well; all because you guys made such poor feed. It is very true that ALL feed manufacturers did make some poor feed last year. Not from choice, but from dire necessity though.

Isn't doing well, you can't blame the feed? For the past several weeks feed has been good. We have everything to make good feed, and are using it. To be sure, the bureaucrats limit us to certain amounts of protein in all feeds, and we know all patriotic feed companies are staying within the prescribed limits.

For instance, Boyd Wetzel just told us about getting 344 GOOD CHIX from 429 eggs. (Over 80%.) And we have other reports, some even a little better. Customers getting 85 to 90% egg production. So if you are not getting satisfactory results, don't blame the feed. Call the feed man, and we will try to figure what IS wrong.
