"Let us lay aside every weight." In this metaphor Paul is calling to the reader's attention the Greek games of the period. He draws the parallel between life and these games. There is the great amphitheater filled with "spectators." The runners who appear to take their places, must first throw off their outer garments, always worn by Greek athletes before a race. That "weight" must be laid aside. Then the contest starts, and the young men stand toward the "mark" with patience and he who endures with the greatest assurance wins the race.

In this simple and direct manner Paul pictures the race of the human soul through life. The first thing we must do is to "lay aside every weight" — for us, not an outer garment but an inner impediment, a "sin which doth so easily beset us." No other man can remove that "weight." It is the runner's task. Then comes the race. It is a long journey over difficult terrain, but he who runs with assurance that Christ is the mark of our goal, can overcome all things. Our supreme purpose is to know and do the will of God. This is a race all may enter and all may win by laying aside every weight and running with assurance. Amen.
