

Two-Line Short Circuit Damages Roseburg Office

Residents of the Carnes district and Roseburg firemen saw simultaneous displays of five works late Monday when the Copee 11,000-volt transmission line fell across the Postal telegraph lines at Carnes. The short circuit caused considerable damage at the Western Union Telegraph company office in Roseburg, to which the Postal facilities were transferred several months ago, following national consolidation of the two systems.

The heavy power load carried into the office at Roseburg destroyed fuse blocks and switches, and caused considerable damage to equipment. The Western Union facilities, however, were not seriously damaged. Members of the fire department brought the blaze under control even before the short circuit was cleared.

The accident resulted, it was reported, from the fact that a road grader had recently struck a wire attached to a pole at Carnes. The impact loosened one of the arms supporting a transmission cable, causing the wire to work loose and drop across the telegraph transmission system.

the war to guarantee that there will not be another. There are no more natural barriers, either of land or sea. Concert of action among the nations is the only guarantee of lasting peace. Until that guarantee is firmly established, this nation cannot for one moment divest itself of the power to protect itself on land and sea and in the air.

Popular Rights Demanded

"Governmental control to a degree approaching absolute dictatorship may be justified in the time of war but it is intolerable in the time of peace. With the conclusion of the war there must be an end to all assumption by the federal government of rights that only the people possess. Government by bureaucracy, commission, agency, executive order and directive is alien and wholly contrary to constitutional representative government.

"These are my views on a few of the many pressing problems. I hope later to amplify my views on these and other problems which confront the people and the congress.

"Governor Snell's appointment of me was for the interim until the November election, and that only. His choice was, as he said, of a man experienced in Washington legislative procedure to carry on the work left incomplete by the tragic death of Senator McNary until the people should have a chance to make their own choice. I am deeply grateful for the honor which he conferred upon me and the confidence which he has shown in my ability to carry on. I shall do my best. Whether I am called upon to further serve is for the decision of the people of Oregon."

James R. Jones, Oakland, reports a huge egg, 7 1/2 by 8 1/2 inches, from a nine-months old White Leghorn pullet of his flock. The egg, in fact, was two eggs, having another hard shelled egg of medium size inside. The outer egg contained a large yolk and more white than in an ordinary sized egg, while the inner egg was of average proportions.

Oklahoma Congress Race Eyed For Clues on Courses Of Roosevelt and Dewey

Democrats and republicans watched the progress of a special Oklahoma congressional election eagerly today in the hope the outcome might give them some clue to the future course of two silent men of politics—President Roosevelt and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

These two, who have given no public indication they would be candidates, were chief beneficiaries of routine delegate-choosing primaries in New York today. A fourth term slate of 90 district democratic delegates was being selected, with a group representing six at-large votes to be picked up at a state convention later.

Dewey was assured of the support of most of 85 district republican delegates, and will have the backing of most of the eight to be elected at the party's state convention.

At Milwaukee, Wendell Willkie climaxed his Wisconsin campaign for the republican presidential nomination with the assertion that the United States "is bogging down internationally."

Observing that the president and other allied leaders early in the war had laid down broad general principles of foreign collaboration, Willkie said "at each successive step we have violated the very principles we have announced as principles for which we fight."

As instances, he listed the "Polish boundary question, the Vietn policy, the policy toward Italian fascists."

Oklahoma Verdict Vital
In Oklahoma, W. G. Stigler, democrat, and E. O. Clark, republican, battled for a democratic house seat in a contest that brought Senate Majority Leader Barkley of Kentucky into the campaign with the declaration that if the opposition wanted to

make the new deal the dominant issue, the democrats were ready to accept the challenge.

Senator Moore (R.-Okla.) asserted that Clark's election would "end fourth term talk." And there were many republicans who contended that a victory for their party in that traditional democratic stronghold might well influence the president's decision.

Last night, Gov. John W. Bricker, of Ohio, who also is seeking the republican presidential nomination, said he believed Barkley's participation in the contest over the seat in Oklahoma's second congressional district, indicated that the administration was "greatly worried."

Asserting his belief that the administration "should be" worried, Bricker added:

"I cannot understand how he (Barkley) can come into Oklahoma demanding unqualified support of the new deal in view of his recent repudiation of the president's veto of the revenue measure."

May Bring Dewey Out

Democrats generally scoffed at the idea that Mr. Roosevelt would chart his course on the outcome of any special election. They said a democratic victory would demonstrate that there is no basic revolt against the president's policies.

Some republicans, who have been wondering if Dewey would rather take his chances of getting the party's presidential nomination in 1948, speculated that a victory for their side in the Oklahoma election might help him make up his mind whether 1944 is the year of opportunity.

Dewey has insisted that he is not a candidate but there have been indications he would accept a draft nomination.

Soldier Cyclist Speeds, Fined \$125

Quennia Ferris Abbott, 21, a soldier from Camp Cook, Calif., en route by motorcycle to his home at Cottage Grove to spend a furlough with his parents, attempted Monday to outrun a state policeman, Justice of the Peace Thomas Hartfield stated in reporting a fine of \$125 paid into the Roseburg court. Abbott, Hartfield said, pleaded guilty to reckless driving and failure to comply with signals of an officer. The court was told, the judge stated, that Abbott was observed traveling at high speed near Dillard and, when the state policeman started in pursuit, tried to outdistance the officer, who chased the speeder through Roseburg before finally overtaking him north of town.

A 30-day jail sentence was suspended when the fine was paid. Other fines reported included Robert J. Wilde, \$10, no operator's license and \$10, no tail-light; L. H. Freyer, \$15, no dog license; Warren Freeman, \$10, no tail-light.

Senator Truman Creates Storm by Backing 4th Term

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—(AP)

—Republican charges that Senator Truman (D.-Mo.) was using his chairmanship to further a fourth term for President Roosevelt blew up a political storm today over the senate's war investigating committee.

Senator Bushfield (R.-S. D.) answered Truman's plea for a continuation of the president's "wise and experienced" leadership with an assertion that the committee which has been critical of some phases of the war effort apparently was "being used now to forward the candidacy of one man for president."

"I think the statement is completely partisan and out of place," Bushfield declared. "The people had hoped that the investigating committee would be entirely non-partisan but it seems now that it is being used to advance a fourth term."

Truman said yesterday that with the crucial European invasion at hand "our commander-in-chief will require prayerful un-

derstanding and vigorous support."

"I think the country realizes," the Missourian said, "that we have wise and experienced leadership. And I am further convinced that this leadership will be continued until the job at hand is completed. No one can divide us in this supreme effort. No patriot will attempt it."

Republican members of the committee said the statement took them by surprise, inasmuch as the group only recently reaffirmed its policy of keeping politics out of its work.

Senator Ball (R.-Minn.) commented that Truman's statement "obviously was made for its political effect" and he and Senators Brewster (R.-Me.) and Burton (R.-Ohio) joined in declaring that the Missourian was not expressing the committee's sentiments.

They challenged also Truman's assertion that home front faults found by the committee "are insignificant in comparison with the great achievements that have resulted."

YOUNG BILL gave me his orders for lunch the other day: "And I'd like three eggs scrambled, please!" I couldn't help reflecting on two facts, first that teenage youngsters have amazing appetites, and second that it's a good thing our farmers are sending so many eggs to market now.

And then I got to thinking about other uses for eggs—and how they can be an important part of every meal, right through the day. Examples:

EGG NESTS FOR BREAKFAST
Toast six 3 1/2-inch rounds of bread on one side. Top toasted side with broiled or fried bacon or ham slice (these could be omitted if not available). Beat 6 egg whites until foamy; add salt and white pepper, continue beating until stiff but not dry. Pipe meringue lightly on toast rounds, with rounded end of egg shell make slight indentation in each meringue; gently slip a yolk into center of each nest. Bake on cookie or baking sheet in moderate oven (350° F.) about 10 minutes or until egg yolk is set. Serves 6.

OMELETTE SUPREME FOR LUNCH
8 eggs 1/2 cup milk
1 tsp. salt 2 tbsp. shortening
1 tsp. enriched flour

Beat eggs well; add salt, flour, and milk. Continue beating until light and foamy. Melt shortening in heavy frying pan; pour in egg mixture. As mixture browns on under side, pull outside edges to center of the pan, letting the uncooked mixture run to the edges; continue until all of the mixture is set; cover; cook slowly until set and well browned, about 5 minutes. Uncover; cut one-inch slit on outer edge of opposite sides; fold through center; turn into hot serving platter. Serve immediately plain; or spread with preserves; or sprinkle with cheese. Serves 6.

And here are some more egg-ideas: To bolster vegetable salad, add sliced hard-cooked egg. For sandwich garnish, slice hard-cooked egg. To make meat or fish loaves hold together, mix one raw egg to each cup of meat or fish. For a shining golden glaze on breads and biscuits, brush surfaces with well-beaten whole egg before baking.

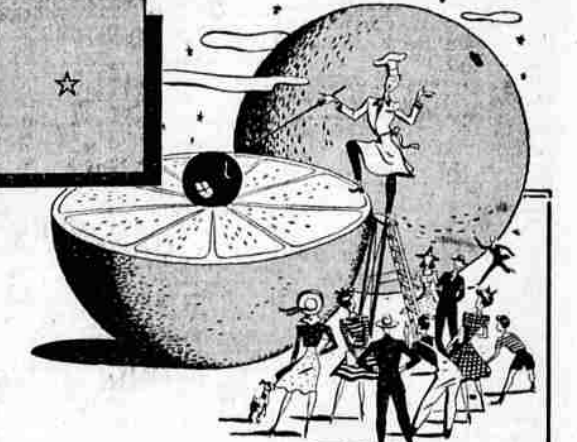
