Rules of Basketball Undergo Four Changes

NEW YORK, Mar. 29.—(AP)—The "string beans" of high school and college basketball no longer will be able to jump up and bat the ball away from the basket when it appears a field goal is certain.

Complying with a widespread demand by coaches that excessively tall players be prevented from using their length for such an advantage, the national basketball committee yesterday adopted a rule that prohibits players from touching the ball on its downward arc, unless the shot is obviously short of the hoop.

The committee also adopted three other rule changes. These provide for five, instead of four personal fouls, before a player is banished from the game; permit

a player to re-enter the game an unlimited number of times; and grant the officials authority to suspend play immediately in case of an injury to a player.
