11 Marine Corps Pilots Down 209 Jap Planes

Included among outstanding fighter plane records of U. S. Marine Corps pilots in the Southwest Pacific — most spectacular of World War II — are the performances of eleven Leatherneck aces who have been credited with shooting down at least 209 enemy planes. Leading Marine Corps aces and the number of Jap aircraft they have downed are, top row, Maj. Gregory "Fappy" Boyington, Okanogan, Wash., 26; Maj. Joseph I. Foss, Sioux Falls, S. D., 25; Lt. Robert Hanson, Newton, Neth. A. Walsh, Washington, D. C., 20; Lt. C. G. John L. Smith, Lexington, Hubbard, Ore., 18; Bottom, Lt. William J. Thomas, Martinsburg, W. Va., 17; Capt. James Sweet, San Mateo, Calif., 14, and Lt. Harold E. Segal, New York City, 12. Other Marine Corps aces include Capt. Donald Aldrich, Chicago, credited with 50 Jap planes, and Maj. Robert Galer of Seattle who has downed 13. Maj. Boyington and Lt. Hanson are listed as "missing in action."

Churchill Gets Record Confidence Vote In Commons; Misunderstanding Over Badoglio "Recognition" Roils Russia

LONDON, Mar. 30.—(AP)—Winston Churchill tonight won his eighth vote of confidence in four years, from a resolute house of commons openly vexed at being called to mark over a minor domestic issue but ready to show its continued support of the government's overall program on the eve of an agreed new phase of allied attack.

The division was 425 to 23—the prime minister's strongest showing since the first three virtually unanimous votes of confidence early in his leadership through the grim days of war-front reverses.

The house, packed with an urgently summoned turnout of government supporters, cheered until the old chamber rang as the vote was announced.

The immediate question was whether the house should stand by its action Tuesday when it overrode the government for the first time in Churchill's four years of wartime leadership by adopting a measure providing equal pay for equal work by men

and women teachers.

Under present wage scales, men teachers receive about 10 to 20 per cent more than women. The government said it did not oppose equal pay, but believed action should be taken on the basis of finding by a committee now working out a new scale.

MISUNDERSTANDING OVER ITALY IRRITATES MOSCOW

MOSCOW, Mar. 30.—(AP)—An editorial in the government newspaper Izvestia explained today that the exchange of envoys with the Italian regime of Marshal Badoglio did not mean full recognition of his government and in effect called on Britain and the United States for a change in the government in Italy.

"The Italian question is one of the important problems confronting the allies and it should be settled as soon as possible to help hasten victory over Germany," the editorial said.

Izvestia expressed irritation with American and British newspapers which, it said, had interpreted the exchange of envoys as meaning soviet support for undemocratic elements in Italy. It added the soviet is willing to have immediate changes in the Badoglio government without waiting for the occupation of Rome.

(Prime Minister Churchill told commons recently that Britain expected to consider the Italian political situation anew when the allies reached Rome.)

Outside of Conference. Pointing out that British and American statesmen have declared this is not the correct time to raise the question of the monarchy's existence or the abdication of King Vittorio Emanuele, Izvestia said "but it cannot be denied that this question was not discussed by all three allied powers—not at the Moscow conference, not at the hounell tables, nor in current exchange of diplomatic opinions."

Referring to Churchill's declaration in the house of commons on February 22 that only in Rome could an Italian government with a solid foundation be formed, Izvestia said "this opinion did not result from common decisions and

discussions of the three allied powers."

Eden Also Rapped.

The editorial also showed irritation over Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden's part in the Italian question. Recalling that he was questioned on March 22 whether the Russians had joined in the provisional agreement on the question of future changes in the Italian government after the occupation of Rome and that he replied that the Russians did not express any dissatisfaction, the paper declared:

4-F Men Needed in War Effort, Says Secy. Stimson

WASHINGTON, Mar. 30.—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today it was essential to draw 4-F men into the war effort, but that he would accept their induction into the army as a labor corps only as a last resort.

Questioned about the statement of Under-Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson, that the army would accept induction of 4-F's who refused to voluntarily enter employment in essential activities, Stimson replied that he agreed fully that the war effort is suffering by failure to utilize this group of men.

Meanwhile, the War Production board announced an official list of urgent manufacturing programs in which the WPB, army, navy and maritime commission will ask draft deferments for key men 22 through 25 years old. Stimson's comment came on the heels of indications on Capitol Hill that something like a million 4-F's between the ages of 18 and 37, inclusive, may soon be given the choice of taking essential jobs or being inducted into some type of labor battalions, either army or civilian.

Chaplin Dozes in Court During Trial

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 30.—(AP)—Charlie Chaplin's own story of his love affairs with Joan Berry formed the defense's climactic testimony today in the film comedian's trial on charges he transported the 24-year-old red-haired film aspirant to New York and back for immoral purposes.

Defense Attorney Jerry Gleser, announcing only a few lesser witnesses remained to be summoned, indicating he expects to call the white-haired 54-year-old British born actor, and perhaps conclude the defense's case, before nightfall.

Federal Judge O'Connor yesterday overruled a defense motion for a directed verdict of acquittal. Frequently Chaplin's interest in the trial seemed to wane. Once during a recess he appeared
