Bonneville Power Rates are Slashed

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 30.—(AP)—The Bonneville Power administration slashed its wholesale power rate today.

Administrator Paul J. Raver estimated savings of from 15 to 30 per cent will accrue to northwest public agencies having no generating capacity and purchasing most of their power from the federal agency.

Reductions of approximately 16 per cent in charges for irrigation and drainage pumping service will result from the new E-2 wholesale rate approved by the Federal Power commission, Raver said.

Wholesale service will be as low as 2.5 mills per kilowatt-hour depending on the amount used, he added.

The new rate was designed to encourage irrigation development in the northwest, increase the region's war food production, stimulate reclamation and irrigation of land for peacetime uses and to encourage other post-war uses for electricity, particularly in home appliances and house heating, a statement by Raver said.

The Bonneville administration has built up surplus revenues despite the fact its rates were the lowest in the United States, Raver said, and is using part of this surplus to lower rates and open new postwar markets for its power.

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Green Feed For Poultry to Save Grain is Advised

Liberal use of green feed for poultry flocks is one of the most practical ways to conserve mill feeds, says J. Roland Parker, county agent. The amount of mash and scratch grains required to produce a dozen eggs can be reduced by 10 to 20 per cent when an adequate amount of green feed is supplied the hens, he says.

In a recent summary of green feed possibilities in Oregon, Noel L. Bennion, extension specialist in poultry at Oregon State college, said that Oregon producers depend mainly upon alfalfa, ladino clover, and kale for year-round green feed purposes.

At this time of the year carrots can be used for the same purpose, although they are not strictly a green feed so far as color is concerned. They are especially high in vitamin A, however, and supply succulence. At present feed prices carrots are worth from \$10 to \$15 per ton for poultry feed. One hundred laying hens will consume from five to seven pounds of carrots a day.

Alfalfa is the most universal source of poultry green feed, either fed fresh or as alfalfa meal in poultry mashes. Young succulent green feeds in addition to the dry alfalfa meal are highly palatable and are a good source of proteins, minerals, and especially vitamins.

An irrigated patch of ladino clover is depended upon by many Oregon poultrymen for a complete summer supply, as it can be cut and fed fresh continuously from about the first of April until November. For winter use kale will provide green feed from October until March.

Lawn clippings, if cut before the grass is too long and tough, are a good source of green feed in summer. For late summer use where irrigation is not available, sudan grass can be used in July, August and September, either for cutting or for pasturing by birds on range.

Wrapping of packages received from service men overseas should be burned, since they may carry the eggs of destructive insects.

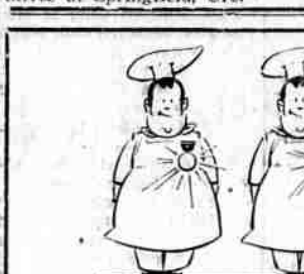
sulted a doctor and Mrs. Holgate visited her mother, Mrs. Lloyd Pinkston, at Sacred Heart hospital.
