Park, a returned missionary from China, who was repatriated on the Swedish ship Gripsholm after six months of internment at Hongkong, where he and his family were caught by the outbreak of war, will speak Friday night at 7:45 o'clock, at the Assembly of God church in Roseburg. He has had 12 years of service in China.

His message will include slides showing scenes in and near Hongkong, heathen worship, festivals, native industries, religious

work, and a few pictures taken at the internment camp. The public is invited to attend.

State Vote on School Fund Plan May Be Asked

PORTLAND, Mar. 30.—(AP)—The Oregon State Teachers' association council will meet here tomorrow to determine whether to place on the November ballot a proposal for a \$10,000,000 state school fund.

The plan, suggested as a means of increasing school resources and offsetting local property taxes, might be placed before the voters as a constitutional amendment or initiative measure, or submitted to the 1945 legislature.

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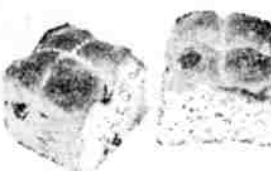
